BE IT RESOLVED, that the contracts, contract amendments and administrative actions of the Human Services & Public Health Department and Department of Community Corrections and Rehabilitation made pursuant to chapters 256E and 393 of Minnesota Statutes, as detailed in Human Services & Public Health Contract Report 2315 be approved; that the report be filed in Contract Management Services; that the Chair of the Board be authorized to sign the contracts, contract amendments, and administrative actions on behalf of the County; and that the Controller be authorized to disburse funds as directed. Such contracts are subject to ministerial adjustment when such adjustments are done within the constraints of the approved Hennepin County Budget and when signed by the County Department Director or Designee.

Background:

The contracted dollar amounts are based on estimates of program costs and/or utilization during prior periods. Funding for each contract is provided for within service categories in the Human Services & Public Health Department and Department of Community Corrections and Rehabilitation approved annual budgets. Occasionally new services are implemented which are not in the budget, but which are fully funded under state or federal grants or other new funding.

Contracted dollar estimates are based upon prior year usage and are subject to fluctuation in placement patterns, service need, and cost shifts. Therefore, it may be necessary to process ministerial adjustments to contracts to increase or decrease contract amounts or to make minor service changes consistent with the department budget and strategic plan. Placement agreements are also processed administratively.

Contracts include services in the following areas: adult mental health; developmental disabilities; chemical health; adult housing; early intervention and family intervention services, interpreter services, health services, welfare advocacy, and various other human services. Expectations for ongoing outcome measurement are included in all new, renewal, or extended contracts. Outcome measures, which are developed by the county and contracted providers, assess the effectiveness of a service and its impact on an eligible recipient's condition or functioning level. Outcome information is used to modify or improve programs as well as to evaluate effectiveness of different types of intervention and providers. A detailed listing of the specific actions requested by this BAR and an explanation of all unusual items is reflected in the summary of the report.







This transfer was approved as Amendment 1 to Agreement A2211275 by the board on July 12, 2022 (Board Resolution 22-0261).

In 2022 Hennepin County applied for and was recently awarded these renewal grant funds for the program year of November 1, 2023 through October 31, 2024. Hennepin County employs two full time Coordinated Entry Assessors who work within the Streets to Housing team, providing housing assessments and housing barrier reduction services to households experiencing homelessness in both site-based and street-based locations. This grant is meant to fill necessary gaps in the homelessness response system by providing mobile and robust housing focused services to assist people in navigating the Coordinated Entry System.

Background:

The Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) is a formula grant program. Eligible recipients generally consist of metropolitan cities, urban counties, territories, and states. Metropolitan cities, urban counties and territories may subgrant ESG funds to private nonprofit organizations. All recipients must consult with the Continuum(s) of Care (CoC) operating within the jurisdiction in determining how to allocate ESG funds.

The City of Minneapolis receives approximately \$949,746 in an annual ESG grant from HUD. The City's Consolidated Plan allocates the grant to shelter rehabilitation and street outreach, rapid rehousing and homeless prevention, and administration. Like Hennepin County, the City of Minneapolis prioritizes rapid rehousing over homeless prevention. Sub-granting the ESG funds dedicated to rapid rehousing from the City to the County will:

- Leverage the County's expertise in social services, and
- Improve alignment with the County's existing rapid rehousing contracted providers and service standards.

The City of Minneapolis has sub-granted ESG funds in this manner since July 2017 via a Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) with Hennepin County (A177584), and which added funds annually via amendment. That JPA was originally approved on August 8, 2017 (Board Resolution 17-0282) and the final amendment to it was approved on October 11, 2022 (Board Resolution 22-0396). It has reached the maximum number of annual amendments allowed. A new, 5-year JPA is needed to sustain the partnership, and the reason that this board action is requested.

The first year of funding under the new JPA is accepted with this resolution. Additional years of funding will be added by amendment and based on future HUD allocations.

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Current request: This action approves the Joint Powers Agreement with the City of Minneapolis (Agreement A2311964) and accepts the first year of funding for \$306,288

Hennepin County will use the ESG funds from the City for rapid rehousing assistance. Rapid rehousing services resettle people experiencing homelessness quickly to permanent housing through housing relocation and short-term and/or medium-term rental assistance. Funds will support housing for single adults, with referrals made through the Coordinated Entry System.

Organizations funded to provide services through this grant include:

- Agate Housing and Services (fka St. Stephen's Human Services)
- Vail Place

Impact/Outcomes: The following are the performance measures for 07/01/22 through 06/30/23 for the Minneapolis ESG funded Rapid ReHousing programs, and as funded under the most recently expired JPA:

- 1. Percent of households that exited the program to permanent housing: 80%
- 2. Average number of days for households to move from homelessness into housing: 54 days

Actual results of measure #1 for the period of 07/01/22 through 06/30/23: 58%

The results of 58% permanently housed is comparable to other singles RRH programs and reflects the fact that many households decline services or disappear before they can move into housing and become stabilized. Looking at the subset of those who move into housing (and across singles RRH funded by Hennepin County), 78% of people are permanently housed at exit.

Disparity Reduction: This request reduces disparities in the housing domain by funding assistance and services that quickly move people experiencing homelessness into permanent housing. In a typical year, 70-80% of households served in RRH are people of color and who are disparately impacted by homelessness and housing instability.

Background:

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) through its Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) awards Emergency Services Program (ESP) funding available every two years through a competitive application process. This funding supports emergency shelter, motel vouchers, day shelter and essential services for children, unaccompanied youth, single adults and families who are experiencing homelessness throughout the State of Minnesota.

Hennepin County Human Services and Public Health applied for this funding in response to the most recent application process earlier this year. The amount of funding available through the Emergency Services Program was increased by \$30 million for this biennium following the recent legislative session as part of the "Pathways Home Act."

Hennepin's application was for \$28,773,365 to reflect the true cost of various outreach and emergency shelter programs for the 2023 to 2025 state fiscal biennium. The priority was to seek support towards the significant costs of family overflow shelter. Recent demand for family shelter services required an increase of \$17,228,900 for fiscal year 2023, as authorized through Board Resolution 23-0144 earlier this year. An amendment to the 2024 budget was submitted for funds to be used in 2024, pending approval.

The Hennepin County application also requested funding to help pandemic recovery funded programs to continue beyond the current 'fiscal cliff' at the end of 2024. In total, \$3,485,099 of the Hennepin County application would have supported 24/7 adult emergency shelter operations in various contracted shelter providers, the new AICDC Homeward Bound shelter and the Streets to Housing team.

On June 28, 2023, Hennepin County was awarded a biennial amount of \$3,500,000 to support family emergency overflow shelter operations and services. The grant award will fund a proportion of the County's multi-site Family Overflow Shelter Program, at a daily capacity of 40 households and 60 household per year. This includes funding 4.0 FTE positions for support and program staff and management.

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Current Request: This action is to accept this funding and approve the A2311975 grant agreement with DHS. The grant will support Hennepin County HSPH's operations and support services for the multi-site Family Overflow Shelter Program.

Impact/Outcome: This action will provide financial support towards Hennepin County's commitment to shelter families that have no other options and need emergency shelter while experiencing homelessness.

Disparity reduction: This request reduces disparities in the housing domain by providing assistance and services for people experiencing homelessness. Most often these are people who are members of groups disparately impacted by homelessness and housing instability.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Administrator be authorized to issue requests for proposal and to negotiate agreements with vendors and/or providers for care coordination, promotion, outreach, community supports, and public awareness relating to vascular and diabetes health, for the term of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024, and for a total amount not to exceed \$1,000,000; and that following review and approval by the County Attorney's Office, the Chair be authorized to sign the agreements on behalf of the county; and that the Controller be authorized to disburse funds as directed.

Background:

In 2021, more than 9,000 Hennepin County residents died due to heart disease. Heart disease is second only to cancer as the leading cause of death for Hennepin County residents. Indigenous and African American/Black residents experience much greater Years of Potential Life Lost compared to White residents in Hennepin County. The rate of deaths due to heart disease were 18.84 deaths per 10,000 for Indigenous and 8.86 per 10,000 for Hennepin County Black/African American residents. Chronic diseases, including hypertension and diabetes, are two of the largest contributing factors in heart disease.

Optimal vascular and diabetes care can substantially reduce an individual's risk of developing heart disease. Fewer Black and Indigenous patients across Minnesota have optimal diabetes control or vascular care. An estimated 37% of Indigenous and 31% of Black/African American residents in Hennepin County have hypertension. Almost a quarter (23%) of Indigenous and 15% of African American/Black residents in Hennepin County have diabetes. Mortality data are reflective of known and death certificate recorded persons (decedent) with heart disease listed as the primary cause of death for Hennepin County residents. This includes deaths that have been recorded by the Hennepin County Medical Examiner, hospital staff, funeral home directors, and other similar roles.

Hennepin County Public Health proposes the following activities to support optimal vascular and diabetes health among Hennepin County residents, including disproportionately impacted African American/Black and Indigenous women. Overall funding is estimated to be approximately \$1,000,000. The timeframe is estimated to be January 2024 through December 2024.

1. Clinical systems and services support

a. Community Health Centers provide access to comprehensive primary and preventive medical, dental, and behavioral health care services to patients who are medically underserved. Many patients depend

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on their affordable high-quality health care provided in conjunction with social and economic wellness programming. Hennepin County Public Health proposes partnering with Community Health Centers and Hennepin County clinics (Mental Health Clinic, Public Health Clinic) to pilot and support care coordination programs for people at risk for heart disease or/or developing diabetes. Hennepin County Public Health Promotion has a current project with the Mental Health Center that we are interested in growing and expanding and it could start immediately on January 1. The estimated cost for this implementation is \$250,000-\$300,000 and would last at least one year. In this pilot, a Community Health Center staff person(s) would provide care coordination for support to people with pre-diabetes and/or hypertension that includes:

- Lifestyle changes
- Smoking cessation
- Future provider appointments
- Social services and/or resources
- b. Hennepin County Public Health would embark on funding a pilot with a healthcare system to support increased care coordination for patients in Hennepin County surviving cardiovascular events. The estimated cost for this implementation is \$200,000-\$300,000 and would last at least one year. Postevent hospital discharge with a patient could include follow-up on:
 - Medication
 - Future provider appointments that may include rehabilitation
 - Exercise
 - Mental health
 - Social services and/or resources

2. Outreach and Community Supports

- a. Community groups and nonprofits are a key source of trusted information in community and serve as a vital link between healthcare services and community members, particularly for those with higher risk for conditions like hypertension and diabetes. There are many grassroots groups and organizations who are working to support Hennepin County residents, including African American/Black and indigenous women who have experienced health events, and funding support would ensure their work continues and will help expand their reach. Estimated cost for community contracts is \$100,000 and would support small mini grants for the following:
 - Community education and lifestyle changes
 - Linkage to healthcare services
 - Support services and groups for community members who have experienced a cardiac event.
- b. Increased awareness among Hennepin County residents, including African American/Black and Indigenous women, through an awareness campaign or support of partners communication efforts. It will take 6 months to put together an 8 to 12-week campaign for an estimated cost of up to \$200,000. This campaign would:
 - Share signs and symptoms of cardiovascular and diabetes
 - Share risk factors for hypertension and diabetes
 - Link residents to community-based resources and culturally relevant care

This request reduces disparities in the health domain by implementing activities that support optimal vascular and diabetes health among Hennepin County residents, including disproportionately impacted African American/Black and Indigenous women.

Recommendation from County Administrator: No Recommendation
