Since 2009, the Department of Community Corrections and Rehabilitation (DOCCR) has operated the Adult Probation Center North office in 8,800 square feet of space located at 4336 Lyndale Avenue North, Minneapolis. The current term ends on August 31, 2024 and the department recommends retaining the space. The county renewed the lease for five (5) years in 2014 through August 31, 2024 (Resolution 14-0169) and extended the lease for five (5) years in 2019 through August 31, 2024 (Resolution 19-0102).

Amendment 2 to Lease Agreement A070387 with Metro Ventures, LLC will extend the lease five (5) years from September 1, 2024 through August 31, 2029. The County will retain the right to cancel the lease with no penalty at any time during the five (5) year extension period with 120 days' written notice to the landlord.

First year's base rent will increase from the current rate of \$8.50 per square foot (\$74,800 annual) to \$8.60 per square foot (\$75,680 annual) and will increase \$.10 per square foot (\$880 annually) each year during the fiveyear renewal period. 

Many of these services prioritize communities disproportionately impacted by HIV including African Americans, Black African born immigrants, Latinx, Indigenous People, and young gay and bisexual men to reduce disparities in HIV related health outcomes.

The agreement also covers administrative costs incurred by county HHS to manage the Part B and rebate

Background:

A Request for Proposal (RFP) was issued on October 12, 2023. Children's Law Center of Minnesota (CLC), the lone proposer, was selected for a new contract. Hennepin County has a long-standing contract history with CLC. Since March 2017, CLC has been the contracted vendor to provide direct legal representation to Hennepin County legacy children and youth, ages 10-21 years. Working with more than 250 dedicated volunteer lawyers, CLC provides their clients a voice in child protection matters and other court proceedings when significant decisions about their future are being made. CLC monitors progress toward adoption and advocates for critical services and necessary resources for their clients to become engaged, independent, and self-sufficient adults.

This request supports the county's disparity reduction efforts in the justice domain by providing improved access to justice and supporting services that address and strengthen the well-being of legacy youths.





Background:

The Hennepin County Energy Center (HCEC), located at 600 10th Avenue South in Minneapolis, is owned by Hennepin County and operated for the county by Energy Center HCEC LLC (Clearway). HCEC supplies steam for heat and chilled water to cool the Hennepin County Government Center, Hennepin County Medical Center, Public Safety Facility, Forensic Sciences Building, Juvenile Justice Center, Health Services Building, Municipal Building, and several buildings owned by private customers.

In 2019, the board approved Agreement A090990 with Energy Center HCEC LLC (Clearway), formerly NRG to operate the facility (Resolution 19-0475). In 2023, the county issued a request for proposals for the management, operation, and maintenance of HCEC. The county received proposals from two companies and selected Ever-Green Energy because it had the most responsive and lowest-cost proposal that met the requirements to operate and maintain the HCEC. Ever-Green Energy is based in St. Paul, Minnesota and has decades of experience operating district energy facilities like the Hennepin County Energy Center.

Current Request:

This request is for approval of authorizing the County Administrator to negotiate Agreement PR00005964 with Ever-Green Energy, Inc. to manage, operate and maintain the HCEC, including routinely scheduled maintenance, during the period March 1, 2024 through December 31, 2034, with a not-to-exceed amount of \$40,000,000.

This contract will be a pass-through contract along with paying Ever-Green Energy a monthly management fee. Eligible pass-through costs will include, but are not limited to, expenditures for labor associated with operating the plant 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, 365 days per year. The remaining costs are for supplies, parts, and other contract services needed by Ever-Green Energy to perform all routine maintenance and repairs at the plant and the steam and chilled water distribution pipes serving customers, as well as assist in the implementation of county approved capital projects.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that following review and approval by the County Attorney's Office, the County Administrator be authorized to sign the agreements on behalf of the county; that costs incurred by the grantees after the board approval date be eligible for reimbursement upon execution of the agreements; that the County Administrator be authorized to approve extensions of a 12-month period to the agreements; and that the Controller be authorized to disburse funds as directed.

Background:

The Environmental Response Fund (ERF) helps revitalize sites by providing funds to assess and clean up contamination. The grants reduce barriers to site improvement or redevelopment caused by the added costs of environmental cleanup and lessen the risk to human health and the environment posed by the contamination.

Minnesota Statutes, sections 383B.80 and 383B.81, authorize the county to collect a mortgage registry and deed tax for the purpose of establishing an environmental response fund. The board established the ERF in 1997 (Resolution 97 06 410R1) and authorized the grant program in 2001 (Resolution 01 615).

Since 2001, ERF has funded 468 projects totaling \$70,238,626.

Projects supported by ERF grants provide a variety of community benefits, including creating affordable and moderately priced housing, supporting economic development, improving green space, and making infrastructure improvements. Many ERF grants address environmental contamination in communities with significant disparities in health, including low-income areas and communities of color. Some of these sites become catalysts for new development in neighboring areas, which can help address racial disparities in housing, employment, and income.

As a major economic center for 150 years, the county has a concentration of contaminated sites. Much of this contamination was caused by chemical spills or improper disposal of hazardous waste prior to the existence of environmental regulations. These improper disposal practices of the past can still cause soil and groundwater pollution that present environmental risks today. In addition, many buildings in Hennepin County, particularly in Minneapolis and the inner ring suburbs, were constructed prior to 1970 when the use of asbestos and lead-based paint was prevalent.

Current Request: This request is to authorize the County Administrator to negotiate 12 ERF grant agreements during various periods, with the total combined amount not to exceed \$1,842,279.

In August 2023, the county solicited proposals from municipalities and nonprofit and for-profit developers. To maximize collaboration between funders, the timing of the ERF grant round coincides with additional contamination cleanup grant programs administered by the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development and the Metropolitan Council.

The county received 14 applications. A committee of staff from Environment and Energy, Housing and Economic Development and Land Information and Tax Services reviewed the grant applications and recommended funding 12 projects. Applications were evaluated on:

- eligibility,
- project need,
- degree of contamination,
- appropriateness of the cleanup approach,
- creation or preservation of affordable and/or moderately priced market-rate housing,
- creation of economic development, and
- the readiness of the project to proceed.

The fall 2023 ERF requests recommended for approval are summarized as follows and are described in the attached report, "Environmental Response Fund Fall 2023 Funding Recommendations."

- **3561 Minnehaha, Minneapolis** \$25,000 for asbestos abatement costs associated with the construction of a mixed-use building comprised of 32 affordable housing units and approximately 1,550 square feet of commercial space. (Grantee: 3561 Minnehaha LLC)
- Aster Commons, Richfield \$21,641 for assessment costs associated with the redevelopment of a vacant site into 38 deeply affordable housing units targeting young adults with neurodiverse conditions with select units set aside for High Priority Homeless and Persons with Disabilities. (Grantee: Aster Commons-GP LLC)
- Avenues for Youth, Minneapolis \$303,550 for soil cleanup costs associated with the construction of eight temporary affordable housing units and 23 emergency beds for young adults facing homelessness or needing supportive services. (Grantee: City of Minneapolis on behalf of Avenues for Youth)
- Bloomington 78th Street Project, Bloomington \$119,000 for soil cleanup costs associated with the

- CLCLT Homes Fall 2023 Minneapolis \$220,000 for lead and asbestos abatement costs associated with the rehabilitation of one duplex and nine affordable owner-occupied single-family homes. (Grantee: City of Lakes Community Land Trust)
- Ebenezer Redevelopment, Minneapolis \$50,000 for assessment costs associated with renovating 110 small senior long-term care facility rooms into 54 new larger affordable residential units. (Grantee: 2545 Portland GP LLC)
- Mikwanedun Audisookon Center for Art and Wellness, Minneapolis \$202,790 for soil cleanup costs associated with construction of a community center building to support youth programs, education, and work force development for the Native American community. (Grantee: City of Minneapolis on behalf of Indigenous People's Task Force)

- **Powderhorn Park, Minneapolis** -\$102,959 for soil cleanup costs associated with the playground and landscape renovation at Powderhorn Park. (Grantee: Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board)
- Prudential Campus Redevelopment, Plymouth \$193,000 for asbestos abatement costs associated with demolishing the existing building and constructing 20 affordable housing unit, 180 market rate units, and commercial space, with future construction plans to include a public park. (Grantee: City of Plymouth on behalf of Scannell Properties and Roers Companies - (SPRC Land Ventures Plymouth, LLC))
- Snelling Yards Family Housing, Minneapolis \$189,913 for soil cleanup and vapor mitigation costs associated with the redevelopment of 90 affordable housing units with a portion targeted to veterans experiencing homelessness. (Grantee: City of Minneapolis on behalf of Snelling Yards Family Housing)
- Sochacki Park Classroom Development, Robbinsdale \$222,913 for soil cleanup associated with the development of a one-story public park classroom building and associated park facilities. (Grantee: Three Rivers Park District)

This request also seeks approval for the county administrator to sign the agreements; allows the grantees to incur costs after the board approval date, with reimbursements being paid upon execution of the grant agreements; and authorizes the county administrator to approve extensions of a 12-month period to the grant agreements.

Impact/Outcome:

The recommended ERF grant awards will fund soil cleanup, vapor mitigation, asbestos and lead abatement, and pre-development assessments. The awards will also assist developments that increase the tax base, create permanent jobs, enhance green space, and create affordable and moderately priced market-rate housing. The recommended grants support the renovation or construction of 466 affordable housing units and 302 units of market-rate units.

ERF grants reduce environmental contamination and support projects in communities with disparities in health, housing, employment, and income. Many of the projects supported by these grants include the construction or renovation of buildings that incorporate sustainable features, including electric vehicle infrastructure, a solar array, and stormwater management, which support the county's climate action goals.

Overview

Background

The Environmental Response Fund (ERF) helps revitalize properties by providing funding to assess and cleanup contamination. This helps recipients overcome barriers that the cost of environmental cleanup pose to site improvement or redevelopment. Cleaning up these sites also reduces the risk to human health and the environment.

ERF grants are used for a variety of activities that provide community benefit, including:

- Assessment and cleanup of soil and groundwater
- Evaluation and abatement of asbestos and lead-based paint
- Protection from contaminated soil gas vapor intrusion

Since 2001, ERF has funded 468 projects totaling \$70,238,626. Funding for the ERF grant program comes from the Hennepin County mortgage registry and deed tax that was authorized in 1997 under Minnesota Statutes, section 383B.80. The board established the ERF in 1997 (Resolution 97-06-410R1) and authorized the grant program in 2001 (Resolution 01-615).

Applications and review process

A committee of seven staff from Environment and Energy, Housing and Economic Development, and Land Information and Tax Services reviewed the applications and made recommendations for funding. Applications were evaluated on project need, the risk posed by the contamination and the appropriateness of the cleanup approach, creation or preservation of affordable and/or moderately priced market-rate housing, the fostering of economic development, and the readiness of the project to proceed.

The timing of the ERF grant round coincides with contamination cleanup grant programs administered by the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) and the Metropolitan Council to maximize collaboration among the three funders.

Summary of applications and recommended award

Fourteen applications were received and reviewed. The committee recommends awarding 12 grants totaling \$1,842,279. All 14 applications and the requested funding amounts are described below. Funding recommendations for each project are provided in the individual application summaries that follow.

- 3561 Minnehaha, Minneapolis \$25,000 for asbestos abatement costs associated with the construction of a mixed-use building comprised of 32 affordable housing units and approximately 1,550 square feet of commercial space. (Applicant: 3561 Minnehaha LLC) Recommended Award: \$25,000
- Aster Commons, Richfield \$21,641 for assessment costs associated with the redevelopment of a vacant site into 38 deeply affordable housing units targeting young adults with neurodiverse conditions with select units set aside for High Priority Homeless and Persons with Disabilities. Hennepin LLC) Recommended Award: \$0. Metropolitan Council has agreed to fund this project.

Expected outcomes

The recommended ERF grant awards will fund soil cleanup, vapor mitigation, abatement activities, and assessment. The awards will also assist developments that increase the tax base, create permanent jobs, enhance green space, and create affordable and moderately priced market-rate housing. The recommended grants provide for the renovation or construction of 466 affordable housing units, 302 market-rate units, and 23 emergency shelter beds. Affordable housing units include single-family, multi-family, senior, and temporary/emergency occupants. ERF grants reduce environmental contamination and support projects in communities with disparities in health, housing, employment, and income.

Other program accomplishments

In 2023, ERF staff conducted a survey of city partners to assess awareness of the ERF program, identify barriers to accessing funding, and get feedback to improve the program. An online survey was sent to 173 city partners from the 45 cities in Hennepin County. Multiple representatives for each city were contacted, apart from very small cities where one person covers multiple roles. Reminder emails were sent, and the survey deadline extended to encourage respondents. A total of 27 staff from at least 15 cities responded to the survey (several respondents didn't identify which entity they represented). While one-third of the cities provided feedback, ERF staff also conducted individual interviews to gather additional feedback from and connect with representatives from more cities.

Feedback from the survey and follow-up interviews provided the following key findings:

- The ERF program is effectively operating as designed, consistent with governing statutes and program criteria.
- Cities with regular brownfields redevelopment were aware of the ERF program and provided favorable feedback on the process and county staff assistance.
- City partners were less familiar with the assessment funding the county and other local programs offer, which is a key tool in helping mitigate surprises and avoiding unexpected contamination.
- Several cities mentioned the desire for funding of sustainability features and other types of development costs that the ERF does not fund.

Based on the feedback obtained, the following recommendations and next steps were determined:

- Increase the frequency and methods of outreach to all municipal partners.
- Conduct more regular outreach to keep city staff up to date and address information loss that can occur with staffing changes.
- Provide case examples of how others used these funds for environmental investigation and planning.
- Highlight sustainability funding provided by other funding programs, such as Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) or Transit Oriented Development (TOD), to the ERF development community.
- Support emerging developers by coordinating outreach with other local governments and Minnesota Brownfields.

In follow-up to the above recommendations, ERF staff has conducted additional outreach with city representatives and partnered with local grantors to jointly host two educational workshops on the grant programs, one of which was specifically focused on emerging developers.

Additional funding mechanisms

In addition to the ERF, Hennepin County offers several other funding mechanisms for brownfields assessment and cleanup. Through grants from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Hennepin County has low-interest loans available for brownfields cleanup in the Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Program. Hennepin County also provides funding for brownfields environmental assessments to cities and nonprofit organizations on a rolling basis. This assessment funding comes from the county's RLF loan repayment proceeds and the Minnesota Brownfields Gap Financing Program (funded through an ERF grant). These flexible funding sources have helped many organizations develop the environmental assessment information needed to submit applications to the ERF, DEED, and the Metropolitan Council for cleanup funding. Four of the 14 ERF fall 2023 applicants have received assessment funding from one or more of these other county funding sources.

Background:

The USDOT RAISE discretionary grant program has \$1.5 billion available in federal fiscal year 2024 to award on a merit-based, competitive basis. USDOT evaluates applications based on criteria of safety, environmental sustainability, quality of life, mobility and community connectivity, economic competitiveness and opportunity, state of good repair, partnership and collaboration, and innovation. Applications are due February 28, 2024, and selections will occur by July 2024. Funding would cover project costs during construction, which is predicted to start in 2026 and go through 2029.

The RAISE awards range from \$5 million to \$25 million per project. The county's applications will request between \$7-10 million for CP 10005877 and \$15-\$20 million for CP 2221000. A local match of 20% is required for projects unless they are located in areas of persistent poverty or historically disadvantaged communities, which are eligible for 100% federal cost share. Due to the project locations, no cost share will be required for local match.

The recommended projects on CSAHs 81 and 152 reflect the county's priorities for transit and transportation needs in terms of asset condition, safety, and accessibility. In addition, these projects would be coordinated with two major regional transit investments, the Blue Line Extension light rail and H Line arterial bus rapid transit.

The county previously received a \$12 million RAISE grant for improvements along Lake Street and Lagoon



The County Auditor is a non-voting member, who must keep an accurate record of the special board's proceedings and orders. The special board's record must be published; like other proceedings of the county commissioners and a copy of the published record must be sent to the Commissioner of Revenue.







Background:

Hennepin County; in collaboration with the City of Minneapolis, Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board, Metropolitan Council, and Minnesota Department of Transportation; is leading a multimodal improvement project along Hennepin and First avenues from Main Street to Eighth Street and along Main Street between Hennepin and First avenues, which is scheduled for construction in 2024.

The county contracted with Bolton & Menk, Inc. through Agreement PR00002153 for design and engineering services at county cost not to exceed \$1.1 million (Resolution 21-0424) and then amended the work authorization to increase the contract to \$1.45 million for additional engineering services (Resolution 23-0142). Amendment 2 will allow for completion of the final design services, increasing the contract to \$1.65 million. In addition, Bolton & Menk was selected from four firms that submitted proposals for construction administration, inspection, and surveying services. The firm is committed to meet the small and minority business project goal of 13%.

CP 2182100 went out to bid in fall 2023, and the ensuing bid opening on December 19, 2023 revealed higher construction costs than originally estimated. The increased costs result in additional budget authority needed to advance the project on schedule. Staff seek board authorization to increase the total budget for CP 2182100 to enable the county to deliver the project.

Current Request: This request seeks authorization to execute the following:

- Amendment 2 to the work authorization under Agreement PR00002153 with Bolton & Menk, Inc. for final design engineering services, increasing the work authorization amount by \$200,000 to a new not to exceed amount of \$1,650,000.
- Agreement PR00005723 with Bolton & Menk, Inc. for construction contract administration, inspection and surveying services for CP 2182100 at county not to exceed \$1,497,000.

Additionally, this request seeks authorization to transfer \$1,497,000 in wheelage tax from CP 2201200 to CP 2182100 and adjust the budget for CP 2182100 to add \$4,000,000 in State Aid Regular, \$252,973 (fund source State - Other - Roads), \$1,711,408 in additional cost participation from the City of Minneapolis and \$300,000 in additional cost participation from MPRB, increasing the total budget by \$7,761,381 (from \$20,490,240 to \$28,251,621) as part of the 2024 Capital Budget.

Impacts/Outcomes: This project aligns with Hennepin County's Mobility 2040 goals, climate action and disparity reduction efforts by improving accessibility, mobility and safety for multimodal transportation. The improvements will also provide connections to future E Line Arterial Bus Rapid Transit Stations.



This funding is available to IIJA grant recipients for transportation-related purposes.

The county was awarded a \$12 million Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant for CP 2193300, which requires a 20% local match (Resolution 23-0287). The county intends to

leverage the state grant for the local match, which will reduce the city and county's share of project costs. An executed agreement with MnDOT is required to receive these funds.

Background:

Waste sort studies continue to show that organic materials comprise about 30% of the trash-the largest proportion of any material. Separating organics from the trash also helps to further progress toward achieving zero waste. Minnesota State Statutes §115A.551 requires metro counties achieve a 75% recycling rate by 2030, and the county's Zero Waste Plan aims to achieve 90% or more. The county's Climate Action Plan also identifies diverting organic material from the trash as an important strategy to reduce emissions.

Recovering organics from the trash is a better use of resources, turning organic materials into compost for healthier soil. Organic material in landfills produces methane, which is 28 times more potent than carbon dioxide in terms of trapping solar radiation and exacerbating climate change. An estimated 58% of the methane that escapes from municipal solid waste landfills is from food waste.

Organics drop-off sites fill a service gap for residents who do not have access to city curbside organics recycling programs. For people who live in multifamily buildings, organics drop-off sites may be the most accessible option for recycling organic waste.

Organics drop-off grants are available to cities, businesses, non-profit organizations, and multifamily properties to cover the initial costs of setting up and hosting public organics drop-off sites in the county.

The county released a request for proposals in the fall of 2023. The county received one proposal, a \$12,000 request from the City of Edina, to establish two new organics drop-off sites and expand three existing sites. Staff recommends funding the proposal.

The City of Edina currently provides curbside organics recycling service to households of up to four units, but the approximately 11,300 households living in multifamily buildings are not included in the city's service. The five organics drop-off sites will supplement the city's curbside organics recycling program. The drop-off sites are the Edina Senior Center, Southdale YMCA, Centennial Lakes Park, Alden Park, and Pamela Park. These sites are near dense multifamily populations and will serve users from Edina, Richfield, and Bloomington. Two of the locations, Southdale YMCA and Centennial Lakes Park, are near environmental justice areas.

Current Request: This request seeks authorization for the County Administrator to negotiate Agreement PR00005863 with the City of Edina for an organics drop-off grant, during the period of January 22, 2024

through January 22, 2026, with an amount not to exceed \$12,000. Board approval is requested because the county has contracts with the city where expenditures exceed \$100,000 during the previous 365 days.

Impact/Outcomes: These funds will expand three and establish two additional organics drop-off sites in the county and increase access to organics recycling, especially for residents who live in multifamily units not served by city programs. These drop-off sites will increase service to more than 11,300 households who live in multifamily buildings and are estimated to collect approximately 41,000 pounds of organics each year.

Diverting organic material from the trash are foundational strategies of the county's Climate Action and Zero Waste plans. Increasing access to organics recycling supports these goals.

Organics drop-off grants also support the county's disparity reduction efforts by increasing access to organics recycling for underserved residents who live in multifamily housing units that do not have curbside service or are in designated environmental justice areas.

Background:

Agreement PR00005904 with Better Futures Minnesota and Agreement PR00005905 with Birch Group, continue the county's support of deconstruction to divert building materials from landfilling. Deconstruction, a building removal technique, systematically dismantles a structure to maximize the recovery of materials for reuse and recycling.

While about 85% of the materials in a typical demolition project could be salvaged and kept out of landfills, currently only about 30% of building materials are reused or recycled. Greater diversion of these materials is possible by changing industry norms. This method removes materials like fixtures, cabinets, windows, flooring, and wood framing intact for reuse. Increasing the amount of building materials recycled is an important zero-waste action.

The county has partnered with Better Futures Minnesota since 2011 to support its goal to divert materials from landfill and providing housing and employment support to formerly incarcerated men. The Birch Group was founded in 2021 by a woman of color with the mission to normalize deconstruction and creating launch pads for people to move to the next level of their lives. The Birch Group operates a building material reuse warehouse in North Minneapolis where deconstructed materials are resold to the community.

In addition to diverting waste, deconstruction also makes building materials available to use in a variety of projects, avoiding the need for new materials. Creating new building materials requires energy - to harvest raw material, process it, manufacturer it into new products, transport it and sometimes to use it. Eighty percent of the emissions attributed to buildings are embodied emissions from the materials used to build them, while operating buildings accounts for 20% of the building's emissions. Diverting construction and demolition waste for reuse or recycling is an important way to reduce greenhouse gas emissions associated with the materials we consume and how we manage waste.

The environmental benefits of deconstruction are compelling; however, it takes longer and costs more to

deconstruct than to demolish. A full deconstruction of a 2,000 square foot house takes up to two weeks and costs around more than double what traditional demolition would cost, which takes a fraction of the time and staff. The funds allocated through these contracts offset the cost of deconstruction to make it a competitive alternative to demolition.

Both Better Futures Minnesota and the Birch Group prioritize employment for underserved communities. Better Futures Minnesota provides job training and support services for primarily African American men with histories of incarceration, substance abuse, mental illness, chronic unemployment, and homelessness. The organization not only focuses on providing short term work, access to job training and job placement but also on community building and renewal, promoting a sense of belonging, volunteer service, and reengagement with family and friends to combat the often-overlooked isolation faced by program participants.

Better Futures Minnesota reports that its participant recidivism rate in 2022 was 8%, compared to the national rate of 25% for individuals that return to prison within their first year of being released. Further, the average annual cost of incarcerating an individual in Minnesota is over \$62,800 per year, compared to the average annual cost of \$18,626 for each Better Futures Minnesota participant. Better Futures Minnesota has calculated a social return on investment of \$3.61 for every dollar invested in its program model.

The Birch Group currently employs eight staff with a focus on hiring marginalized individuals with employment barriers including former incarceration, criminal records, professional experience, and age. The Birch Group expects to hire additional staff as the organization grows and actively recruits from local technical schools, such as Summit Academy OIC and Goodwill-Easter Seals Minnesota, to provide real-life professional experiences to participants.

Current Request: This request seeks approval of Agreement PR00005904 with Better Futures Minnesota to provide deconstruction services for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025, in an amount not to exceed \$400,000.

This request also seeks approval of Agreement PR00005905 with the Birch Group to provide deconstruction services for the period January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025, in an amount not to exceed \$200,000.

The 2024 Environment and Energy budget includes \$300,000 in expenditures for these services. Funding for these agreements comes from the Solid Waste Enterprise Fund.

Impact/Outcomes: The deconstruction services funded under these agreements will expand existing markets and create new viable markets for reusable and recyclable building materials and divert valuable resources from landfilling. Under these agreements, as many as 80 buildings will be fully or partially deconstructed.

This contract supports the county's zero-waste and climate action goals. Diverting construction and demolition waste for reuse or recycling is an important way to reduce greenhouse gas emissions associated with the materials we consume and how we manage waste.

These agreements support the county's effort to reduce disparities in the employment domain by providing job training and other services to primarily African American men with histories of incarceration, substance abuse, or other challenges.

Background:

Hennepin County; in collaboration with the city, Minnesota Department of Transportation, Met Council and University of Minnesota; is leading a multimodal improvement project along University Avenue (County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 36) and Fourth Street (CSAH 37) between Interstate 35W and Oak Street. This project, which is scheduled to begin construction in 2024, will complement Metro Transit's E Line Arterial Bus Rapid Transit (ABRT) project planned along these corridors.

The board authorized agreements PW 19-20-22 with the city and PW 31-67-23 with Met Council for cost participation and maintenance of improvements constructed as part of CP 2167301 (resolutions 220199 and 230186). Based on bids opened on December 5, 2023, the construction costs have increased resulting in the city's cost increasing by \$2,080,377 and Met Council's cost increasing by \$1,016,932. The county's increased share of the project will be funded by the project budget.

Current Request: This request seeks authorization to adjust the budget for CP 2167301 by adding \$2,080,377 in city cost participation and \$1,016,932 in Met Council cost participation, increasing the total budget by \$3,097,309 as part of the 2024 Capital Budget.

Impacts/Outcomes: This project aligns with the county's Mobility 2040 goals, climate action and disparity reduction efforts by improving accessibility, mobility and safety for multimodal transportation. This includes a connection to the future E Line ABRT service in an area with a high percent of no-vehicle households near the University of Minnesota.



Through Resolution 17-0207, adopted on June 13, 2017, the County approved the assumption of certain unpaid funding commitments for the METRO Green Line Extension Light Rail Transit Project (CP 1005876) ("Project"), the assumption of the 2017 Capital Grant Agreement (Counties Transit Improvement Board #01-2017-01/Met Council #171007) ("CTIB Grant Agreement") with the Metropolitan Council ("Council") for the Project, and the imposition of the 0.5% Hennepin County transportation sales and use tax and \$20 motor vehicle excise tax that are the primary sources of funds for Hennepin County contributions to the Project. Through these and other actions, Hennepin County agreed to take responsibility for the remainder of the 30% share of project funding formerly committed by the Counties Transit Improvement Board ("CTIB") and the remainder of the 10% share formerly anticipated from the State of Minnesota. The Hennepin County Regional Railroad Authority ("HCRRA") provided funding for the Project, as well, under separate grant agreements.

On May 31, 2018, the County adopted Resolution 18-0222, committing County funding to the Project in an amount up to \$592,953,000, in addition to the CTIB contribution. Resolution 18-HCRRA-0027, adopted on May 31, 2018, committed HCRRA funding in an amount up to \$199,548,000. On November 15, 2018, the County adopted Resolution 18-0500, committing funding of up to \$200.3 million, in addition to the funds committed in Resolution 18-0222, to cover potential cost increases or funding shortfalls. (Resolution 18-0500)

was subsequently revised by Resolution 19-0220, adopted May 20, 2019.)

Also, on November 15, 2018, the County adopted Resolution 18-0499, which among other actions authorized negotiation of a new grant agreement with the Council and HCRRA, Agreement PR00000689 ("Capital Grant Agreement"), to replace the amended CTIB Grant Agreement and to be the sole funding source for all Project activities through the end of August 2019. On the same day, HCRRA adopted Resolution 18-HCRRA-0056, likewise authorizing the negotiation of the Capital Grant Agreement to replace the existing HCRRA grant agreement.

The Capital Grant Agreement was then negotiated and executed, with a not to exceed amount of \$434,901,943 in total funds from the County (up to \$347,921,554) and HCRRA (up to \$86,980,389). The funded activities included civil construction work authorized by the FTA, any pre-award authority activities requiring and receiving prior approval by the Hennepin County and HCRRA boards, and ongoing overhead expenses and other professional services related to the Project.

The Capital Grant Agreement has since been amended 10 times. Each time, HCRRA likewise approved negotiation of the same amendment on the same day as the County Board's approval. The amendments were as follows:

- Amendment 1 extended the term through September 30, 2019. (Resolution 19-0363)
- Amendment 2 extended the term through March 31, 2020, increased the maximum grant amount to \$553,456,897, and made other contract changes. (Resolution 19-0368)
- Amendment 3 extended the term through June 30, 2020 and increased the maximum grant amount to \$602,795,681. (Resolution 20-0089R1)
- Amendment 4 extended the term through August 31, 2020 and increased the maximum grant amount to \$677,765,449. (Resolution 20-0236)
- Amendment 5 extended the term through November 30, 2020. (Resolution 20-0321)
- Amendment 6 extended the term through January 31, 2022. (Resolution 20-0456)
- Amendment 7 extended the term through June 30, 2022 and increased the maximum grant amount to \$878,080,704. (Resolution 21-0297)
- Amendment 8: extended the term through December 31, 2022. (Resolution 22-0237)
- Amendment 9: extended the term through June 30, 2023 and increased the maximum grant amount to \$978,080,704. (Resolution 22-0538)

Impact/Outcomes: Approval of this request will allow for continued construction activities for the METRO Green Line Extension.

- Update and modernize marriage license application and reporting statute language; clarify marriage officiant requirements, standardize marriage certificate forms and allow deputy registrars to make technical corrections to marriage licenses.
- Support modifying or increasing certain marriage license, motor vehicle, watercraft, off road vehicle, and driver's license filing fees to make deputy registrars' offices more self-sufficient and reduce administrative burdens for local registrars.
- Make permanent the ability for people to remotely apply for marriage licenses.
- Support revenue sharing with the state's Driver and Vehicle Services for online transactions.
- Support legislation to lower costs for e-materials purchased by public libraries to allow for continued and consistent access by residents.
- Increase the amount of contracting and procurement the county does with small businesses and minority and women-owned companies by modifying set-aside contracting authority.

Data practices

- Oppose changes to the Minnesota Data Practices Act that require audit logs or audit trails that impose an undue financial or resource management burden on local units of government.
- Protect residents' personal information by making a person's address, phone number and email address private data.

- Support legislation that bases email retention policies on the information contained within the record and not on the file type to which it is stored; oppose legislation that requires government entities to retain emails that are not part of the official record and do not serve a business purpose.
- Update the Official Records Act to permit the digitization of all official records without prescribing the medium or technology.
- Support legislation changing notification of data breaches to only when the individual is at risk of harm. Reduce risk to counties by limiting monetary damages for alleged violations of the Data Practices Act to actual harm to an individual by an unauthorized disclosure of data.

Broadband

- Support changes to the state's Border-to-Border grant program to ensure that urban and suburban areas receive proportionate shares of state and federal broadband funding.
- Ensure state-administered broadband programs improve speed of existing services and are affordable for all residents.

Hennepin Healthcare System

Ensure access to the full continuum of health care services for all by addressing racism as a public health crisis through policies that reduce health disparities, increase equity, support the capacity of the healthcare workforce, and create financial stability for Hennepin Healthcare System as the state's safety-net provider.

Increase the financial stability of Hennepin Healthcare System

- Maximize Medicaid reimbursement and supplemental funding sources, including maintaining Medicaid direct payments, to support the largest Medicaid provider system and safety-net trauma hospital to manage the challenges of caring for a disproportionate share of medically and socially complex patients.
- Strengthen value-based-payment arrangements in Medicaid that improve outcomes and manage higher care costs associated with

serving a disproportionate number of Medicaid patients with unmet social needs.

 Preserve hospital capacity for patients who need inpatient care by ensuring patients can swiftly and safely discharge to an appropriate setting through streamlining processes and investing in the capacity of long-term care, children's mental health services in the community, and other higher acuity mental health settings.

Increase health equity and improve population health through innovation and reform

- Support state investments to reduce health disparities in mental health and maternal health care, including supporting birthing people experiencing substance use disorder during pregnancy, and expanding trauma-responsive health care. Support innovative public health and health-care delivery models that address social drivers of health; expanding the definition of the state plan benefit for Community Health Worker care coordination under Medicaid; and ensuring Hennepin Emergency Medical Services are available to all residents.
- Promote efforts to address the state's opioid crisis, including increased access to medication-assisted therapy, alternative pain management therapies, peer recovery supports, and Medicaid coverage while detained pre-trial.
- Support hospital-based violence intervention programs, gun-violence prevention efforts, and penalties that address workplace violence; increase the safety of our communities, employees, and patients.

Support the capacity of the health care workforce to ensure the delivery of exceptional care

- Promote policies that support increasing staff capacity in the health care workforce, including maintaining telehealth, improving licensing flexibilities and access to interpreters, and the licensure of Certified Midwives.
- Partner to ensure the evolution of academic medicine in Minnesota supports a strong health care ecosystem, creates a workforce reflective of patients, and addresses existing workforce and provider

shortages in Minnesota, especially in the mental health-care system. Remove barriers to employment for justice-involved individuals and enact programs that create a pathway for youth of color to enter and stay in health-care professions.

• Support efforts to increase equitable access to medical education, including maintaining current state investment in Graduate Medical Education and health-care workforce development, including tax incentives for educators and continued funding for Project Echo for real-time learning for front-line providers.

Health and human services

Ensure that mental health, chemical health, disability services, and public health systems work to improve outcomes for all residents, especially the most vulnerable. Reduce disparities by supporting preventative models of care and early intervention services to avoid over-reliance on crisis response. Advance new policies and funding mechanisms that recognize racism as a public health crisis.

Systems reforms

- Improve technological systems, including METS, MAXIS/MEC², SSIS, PRISM, and MnCHOICES, to streamline and provide efficiencies and simplification to Health and Human Services Program requirements.
- Support changes to align and simplify program access and program rules.
- Maintain state support for local public health capacity to address health crises.
- Ensure payment parity in access and delivery of waiver-funded human services and health care programs when delivered virtually.
- Expand health-care access and coverage that promote and improve health outcomes by granting continuous eligibility for Medical Assistance and MinnesotaCare for one year after eligibility is determined.
- Support comprehensive and equitable capitation rates under Minnesota Health Care Programs by adding social risk factors and revenue risk score adjustments into the rate calculation.

- Support the sustainability of Personal Care Assistant (PCA) services to eliminate service disruptions and ensure around-the-clock access for eligible families.
- Increase state financial, technological, and administrative support to address caseload demands across the disability services continuum.
- Support legislation that bolsters supportive services for all veterans and their families.
- Support technical fixes to 2023 cannabis legislation to fortify counties' public health role, including the logistics of monitoring, inspections, enforcement, regulation, and taxation.
- Support reforms to 2023 cannabis legislation that promote the education, well-being, and behavioral health needs of youth in the context of legal adult use.
- Address the social determinants of health by expanding state support for the integration of programs within county affiliated structures.
 Oppose policies that fragment these services or otherwise create barriers to access.
- Support legislation to align recreational cannabis use with existing regulations limiting secondhand commercial tobacco smoke in multi-unit housing.

Invest in children and families

- Address the significant cost burden of child care for working families, a key factor in preventing communities from building wealth.
- Support state investment in and for community-driven solutions to improve maternal health, birth outcomes, and public health programming (e.g., Children and Teen Checkups, targeted home visiting, doula care), especially for communities of color.
- Advance legislation that reduces the disproportionate number of African American and American Indian children in the child protection system and increases frequency and timeliness of reunification.
- Support legislation to remove barriers created by current foster care licensing requirements that result in fewer African American and American Indian foster families.

- Support stabilizing transition to adulthood from the child protection system for county youth.
- Ensure educational stability for youth in foster care.

Invest in health through mental health and substance use disorder services access and improvements

- Increase state support to meet the needs of county residents with mental health challenges, including culturally responsive services, early crisis interventions, and services required for stabilizing residents in the community.
- Invest in preventive upstream services to reduce the harmful impact of substance use disorder and the opioid epidemic, including readily available opiate antagonists as an alternative to emergency crisis requests.
- Support efforts to integrate mental health, housing, chemical health, and criminal justice interventions-especially data-, to improve residents' outcomes and reduce recidivism.
- Support integrated state-county funding and services model to comprehensively address the needs of children and families with complex behavioral health issues.
- Support efforts for smokefree campuses for mental health and substance use disorder treatment providers.
- Support legislation to end the sale of all menthol and flavored commercial tobacco products statewide.
- Support greater state investment in mental and chemical health services delivered in primary care settings.

Housing

Increase state resources to support safe and stable housing for all individuals and families.

 Increase accessible, affordable long-term housing for residents with no income up to 50% Area Median Income (AMI), prioritizing affordability up to 30% AMI.

- Increase housing and related services options for residents with disabilities exiting or diverting from institutional care who need on-site support to integrate their communities successfully.
- Provide capital support and sustainable operational funding to make safe, dignified, and housing-focused emergency shelters available to residents experiencing homelessness.
- Continue to reform the Housing Support Program to remove the financial disincentives that cause residents to choose unsheltered settings and ensure the program reflects real costs in the housing market.
- Support dedicated revenue to and reduce administrative burden on counties to meet affordable housing needs.

Law, safety and justice

Preserve and protect public safety through state-county partnerships that address funding challenges and support reform.

Increase funding

- Promote fully funding the newly created community corrections formula to ensure adequate and ongoing state funding for supervision of individuals under court jurisdiction in the community.
- Support investments in community providers necessary to support successful reintegration of individuals in the criminal legal system into the community.

Remove barriers

- Support the unique needs of those involved in the criminal legal system who are female identified and/or juveniles by strengthening collaboration with and funding for trauma-informed and culturally specific community-based programming in support of corrections systems.
- Support statutory changes to remove barriers in housing and employment for the survivors of human trafficking and those formerly involved in the criminal legal system.

- Expand expungement statute to support individuals with housing or employment barriers who have demonstrated a commitment to rehabilitation and community enhancement.
- Support state leadership to integrate human-centered design principles and to coordinate the efficient administration of public safety answering points (PSAP's) across jurisdictional lines.
- Ensure fully effective legal counsel by expanding information sharing of information for clients served by Adult Representation Services.
- Support efforts to ensure that non-citizen residents are assured due process in the criminal legal system, be free from harassment, and supported in their efforts to remain in Minnesota and contribute to community vibrance.

Improve outcomes

- Promote licensing and systems reforms to support healthy outcomes for youth involved in the criminal legal system.
- Support a regional cost-effective evidence-based solutions that delivers better outcomes and lowers recidivism for youth supervised by probation. Adopt recommendations from Working Group on Youth Interventions.
- Support legislation that creates a safer working environment for staff.
- Ensure further reforms to the "48-hour rule" facilitate greater access to behavioral health services and reduce racial disparities in the public safety and health systems.

Taxes

Protect state funding for mandated services and assure flexibility to serve our residents without undue reliance on property taxes.

- Support County Program Aid (CPA) that funds county-mandated services and reduces reliance on property tax.
- Ensure veterans and their spouses/partners remain eligible for the veterans' property tax exclusion.
- Modernize property tax regulations to improve equity for vulnerable populations, reduce disparities, and close loopholes.

- Support legislation that promotes adoption of conservation easements.
- Update state assessor duties to reflect modern guidance and standards provided by the International Association of Assessing Officers (IAAO) and allow assessors to access data to ensure accurate and transparent assessments.
- Support efforts to make the property tax system more equitable by expanding homestead market value exclusion, property tax refunds, and modifying classifications.
- Correct technical deficiencies in recently adopted Metro Housing Sales Tax.

Transportation

Strengthen the long-term value of neighborhoods and communities through strategic public investments in infrastructure that improve mobility and safety, connect people to jobs, reduce disparities, and reduce transportation carbon emissions.

- Collaborate with corridor agency partners on an anti-displacement legislative package to aid in protecting and building equity for existing community members and businesses.
- Support legislation that promotes the advancement of the Blue Line Light Rail Transit Project. This includes, but is not limited to, right-ofway acquisition, insurance, liability, interjurisdictional coordination, federal regulatory requirements, and funding.
- Support the Metropolitan Council's implementation of Arterial Bus Rapid Transit (ABRT), including fully funding ABRT project scope, along various routes in Hennepin County to provide shorter transit times, increased ridership, and expanded mobility for communities along the proposed lines.
- Support state investments to implement and maintain infrastructure and Toward Zero Deaths initiatives that enable safe access for all users, including Active Transportation, Complete Streets and Green Streets, to provide modal options, improve quality of life and reduce unsafe driving practices that lead to traffic injuries and fatalities.

- Modify the special distribution of leased vehicle sales tax in the metro area to fairly include Hennepin and Ramsey counties.
- Oppose any increase in weight or size limits for commercial trucks and other motor vehicles.
- Support increased funding for the Local Bridge Replacement Program and the Local Road Improvement Program, including funding for the Hennepin Avenue Bridge reconditioning project.
- Support MnDOT's Corridor of Commerce program and funding to achieve the full corridor vison for projects in Hennepin County.
- Support state investments to reduce transportation carbon emissions, including, but not limited to, vehicle and transit electrification, electric vehicle charging stations, and infrastructure that connects people by all modes of travel.
- Support state investment in Advanced Transportation Management System including traffic management cameras, fiber optic communication, and advanced software.

Workforce development

Meet the future workforce needs of Hennepin County and other employers and address persistent disparities by, with stronger state support, connecting well-trained and qualified individuals to high-demand jobs in our region.

• Support efforts to raise and protect wages for residents at the lowest income levels and industries most affected by the pandemic, including raising the minimum wage to provide a livable wage and reflect regional costs of living.

Resolution:

WHEREAS, in 1925, Carter G. Woodson founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History and conceived and announced Negro History Week to be celebrated during the week encompassing the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglas in February 1926; and

WHEREAS, in 1976, then President Gerald R. Ford expanded the celebration to a month and urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every endeavor throughout our history"; and

WHEREAS, the consequences of historical disinvestment of Black communities in Hennepin County must be acknowledged and the reparation of these harms centered in the work of the county across all lines of business; and

WHEREAS, repairing harm that has deeply impacted Black residents is in alignment with Hennepin County's declaration of racism as a public health crisis; and

WHEREAS, we understand that by addressing with intention the complex legacy of suppression and discrimination in housing, healthcare, child protection, education, and economic mobility- we build a better tomorrow for the next generation of Black residents; and

WHEREAS, all Hennepin County students, educators, and residents should know the rich history and contributions of Black people in Hennepin County, rededicating ourselves to nurturing a bright future for our Black students and residents; therefore Resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Hennepin County Board of Commissioner hereby proclaims February as National Black History Month to recognize the amazing and everlasting efforts and accomplishments of Black descendants of the African diaspora in Hennepin County, Minnesota, and the United States of America.
