Background:

In 2014, the State Legislature appropriated \$3 million to the County for the predesign, design, renovation, furnishing and equipping of an early childhood center at the YWCA of Minneapolis building located at 1130 Nicollet Mall. The State then provided these funds to the County through Grant Agreement A140979 between the County and the Minnesota Department of Human Services, the grantor. The original bonding appropriation and, subsequently the grant agreement, was amended in 2015 to expand the eligible uses of the funds to include other building improvements. The YWCA provided \$3 million of matching funds toward the project.

State law required that the County, as grantee, have an ownership interest in the property to be improved, which would house the governmental program in question - the early childhood center. In order to fulfill this requirement and to accomplish the goals of the appropriation, the County entered into Ground Lease A140980 over the entirety of the property at 1130 Nicollet Mall owned by the YWCA. The County then leased the building

24-0211

back to the YWCA through Lease/Use Agreement A140981. The County Board authorized Agreements A140979, A140980, and A140981, through Resolution 14-0258, adopted July 17, 2014.

In 2023, the YWCA determined that it would close its fitness center in the Nicollet Mall building and put the property up for sale. The YWCA continues to operate its early childhood center in the building. Under state law, capital projects that are wholly or partially funded with state bond proceeds become "state bond-financed property" and are subject to a variety of requirements, including actions that must occur if there is a change in use or ownership of the property. County staff therefore reached out to the YWCA and to state officials at Minnesota Management and Budget and Minnesota Department of Human Services to plan for the potential sale and identify actions the County and the state must take if the building were sold.

On November 30, 2023, St. David's Center submitted a letter of intent to purchase the underlying fee title of the YWCA building and subsequently entered into a purchase agreement with the YWCA. St. David's is a leader in child and family development, offering educational, therapeutic, and support services including early childhood education, mental health and pediatric therapies, autism treatment, home visits, and disability services to approximately 4,300 children and families annually.

St. David's proposes to purchase and renovate the building to expand early childhood services available for children struggling with trauma or behavioral and developmental issues. It would operate the majority of services itself and also lease a portion of the facility back to the YWCA to continue providing the current program of licensed childcare services. St. David's has commenced a fund-raising campaign to fund a portion of the proposed renovation of the building and intends to seek additional state bonding support in the 2025 legislative session. It intends ultimately to use the entire building for children's services; in contrast, the YWCA only uses a portion of the building for its early childhood education programming.

To accomplish this transition, St. David's proposes that it acquire fee title to the property from the YWCA. At the same time, it would assume all rights and obligations of the YWCA under the ground lease and the lease-use agreement with the County. These two agreements would be amended and restated, to substitute St. David's for the YWCA and to make assorted small conforming changes.

This Resolution would effectuate the proposed transactions. The first resolving clause would consent to the assignment by the YWCA of the Ground Lease to St. David's. The second resolving clause would authorize negotiation of an Amended and Restated version of the Ground Lease, which would substitute St. David's for the YWCA as the lessor and make other conforming changes. The third resolving clause would consent to the assignment by the YWCA of the Lease/Use Agreement to St. David's. The fourth resolving clause would authorize negotiation of an Amended and Restated version of the Lease/Use Agreement, which would substitute St. David's for the YWCA as the tenant and make other conforming changes.

This request is to establish a fiber optic Principal Agreement with the Eden Prairie School District. The School District has an immediate need to connect a newly acquired facility near existing Hennepin County fiber infrastructure. Having a Principal Agreement in place with this public entity partner will allow for this fiber optic project work and future work to be completed swiftly and seamlessly.

Like the previously approved fiber optic Principal Agreements, the requested agreement will not commit county funds, rather individual Statements of Work (SOWs), which are subject to provisions of its Principal Agreement, will be issued detailing specific fiber optic projects. Community Connectivity, Public Works, Facility Services, and IT-Network Communications will be able to utilize the agreement to create SOWs, with the Community Connectivity team providing oversight.

Pricing will be agreed upon at the SOW level, where projects may be zero-cost, receivables, or expenditures to the county. This request also seeks Board authorization to allow the County Administrator to negotiate and sign individual SOWs under the Principal Agreement. Background:

The Hennepin County Board adopted Resolution 09-0320R3, establishing the Hennepin County Youth Sports Program with ballpark sales tax collections pursuant to Minn. Stat. 473.757, subd. 2. The County Board expanded the program with the adoption of Resolution 11-0318R1 which provided for additional grants to be awarded for equipment and/or small assets; and Resolution 15-0332R1 which provided for additional grants to be awarded for playground projects and swimming lessons; and Resolution 21-0337 which provided for additional grants to be awarded for art and music education and programming as well as lifeguard services; and Resolution 23-0087 which delegated signature authority to the Purchasing Director and allowed for review and updating of grant evaluation criteria. In 2023, the Hennepin County Board adopted Resolution 23-0153 that renamed the program to Hennepin County Youth Activities Grants to be inclusive of additional activities supported by the funding.

The Hennepin County Youth Activities Grants program has three grant initiatives that include sports grants, water safety grants, and art and music grants. Grant opportunities are available semiannually in the fall and spring. Since 2016, the HCYAG program has provided grants for traditional playgrounds. For the 2024 cycle, the grant opportunity was renamed to Play Spaces with grant opportunities for both traditional and non-traditional play areas for kids. A total of \$1 million was allocated for spring 2024 play spaces grants.

Applications for 2024 play space grants were accepted from January 18 through April 1, 2024. A Pre-Application Conference was held on February 6, 2024 and technical assistance was available for potential applicants. A total of 10 applications were received and all applications are recommended for award.

Recommended play space projects include:

- 1. Brooklyn Center Community Schools ISD 286 grant funding will provide support for a multi-phase upgrade to an elementary school playground to ensure that it is accessible, inclusive, and green.
- 2. City of Bloomington grant funding will support the creation of a fully inclusive playground structure at Bryant Park.
- 3. City of Crystal grant funding will support replacement of existing play structures that are 20+ years old with accessible and upgraded features.
- 4. City of Dayton grant funding will provide a playground for a newly created park in Dayton, MN situated between 4 new housing developments.
- 5. City of Richfield grant funding will support **two** playground projects including upgrading and replacing playground structures that are 27 years old at a youth athletic complex in Richfield and construction of a new playground on a currently vacant plot of land.
- 6. Minneapolis Schools SSD1 grant funding will replace equipment at an existing playground site that is more than 30 years old.
- 7. City of St. Bonifacius grant funding will support replacement and enhancement of a playground that is 60 years old.
- 8. Edina Public Schools ISD 273 grant funding will support replacement of playground equipment that is 20+ years old.
- 9. City of Tonka Bay grant funding will be used to replace an existing fishing pier.

Current Request:

The State Dislocated Worker and Minnesota Youth programs operate in conjunction with the federal programs and have similar goals, measures and outcomes, but are funded at the state level.

Under Resolution 21-0229, Hennepin County is authorized to receive funds from the Department of Employment and Economic Development during the period April 1, 2021 through March 31, 2026 for the provision of services under WIOA Adult, Youth, Dislocated Worker, MN State Dislocated Worker, and

On November 16, 2023, the Workforce Development Board (WDB) issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) pursuant to Hennepin County requirements for the WIOA Adult, Dislocated Worker, and MN State Dislocated Worker Programs as well as an RFP pursuant to the Hennepin County requirements for the WIOA Youth and Minnesota Youth programs. An independent panel of eight reviewed and selected providers for client services for the period of July 1, 2024 through December 31, 2027. On January 31, 2024 the Hennepin-Carver WDB approved Hennepin County Office of Workforce Development (OWD) to enter into contract negotiations with the recommended organizations established by the RFP evaluation panel.

Contracted providers will partner with Carver County to provide services for the Hennepin-Carver Workforce Development Area. This area is comprised of suburban Hennepin and Carver counties and is formed under a Joint Powers Agreement specific to the implementation of WIOA, which assigns administrative duties for the area to Hennepin County.

The agreements include programmatic mandated services such as:

- 1. Career Services Outreach, job search and placement assistance, comprehensive assessments, development of individual employment plans, counseling and career planning, and labor market information available to all job seekers.
- 2. Training services Links for customers to job opportunities in their communities, including both occupational training and training in basic skills. Participants use an individual training account to select an appropriate training program from a qualified training provider.
- 3. Supportive services Transportation, child care, dependent care; housing and needs-related payments are provided under certain circumstances to allow an individual to participate in the program.
- 4. WIOA Youth services Summer and year-round employment, work experience and academic enrichment to suburban Hennepin and Carver Counties with 75% out-of-school youth and 25% inschool youth.
- 5. Minnesota Youth services Summer employment, work experience, and academic enrichment to suburban Hennepin County in-school and out-of-school youth.

Occasionally new services are implemented which are not in the budget, but which are fully funded under state or federal grants or other new funding.

Contracted dollar estimates are based upon prior year usage and are subject to fluctuation in placement patterns, service need, and cost shifts. Therefore, it may be necessary to process ministerial adjustments to contracts to increase or decrease contract amounts or to make minor service changes consistent with the department budget and strategic plan. Placement agreements are also processed administratively.

Contracts include services in the following areas: adult mental health; developmental disabilities; chemical health; adult housing; early intervention and family intervention services, interpreter services, health services, welfare advocacy, and various other human services. Expectations for ongoing outcome measurement are included in all new, renewal, or extended contracts. Outcome measures, which are developed by the county and contracted providers, assess the effectiveness of a service and its impact on an eligible recipient's condition or functioning level. Outcome information is used to modify or improve programs as well as to evaluate effectiveness of different types of intervention and providers. A detailed listing of the specific actions requested by this BAR and an explanation of all unusual items is reflected in the summary of the report.

The Prevention Services allocation can be used to support local welfare agency activities to develop and implement prevention services identified in, or related to and within, Minnesota's Title IV-E Prevention Services five-year plan.

Funds are intended for children who remain with their families, or upon return to their family, including:

- Prevention of entry into the child welfare system.
- Prevention of further involvement with the child welfare system.
- Family preservation (supports necessary to maintain children within their families).

This \$50,000 annual grant, with a required \$50,000 local match from DOCCR, is used to contract with Attic Correctional Services for targeted case management and housing support services. This service will enhance housing capacity for DOCCR clients, reduce barriers to finding permanent housing and increase employment outcomes with the goal of reducing recidivism.

Agreement PR00003883, Amd 3, Attic Correctional Services

This agreement with Attic facilitates access to community housing by supporting clients who are at-risk for homelessness or experiencing homeless in applying for and retaining placements in private housing options that are safe and affordable. This agreement will fill an important gap for DOCCR clients, allowing them to receive both treatment services and transitional housing accommodations under one roof.

Steps for Change has provided non-residential outpatient treatment services for DOCCR juvenile clients since 2014.

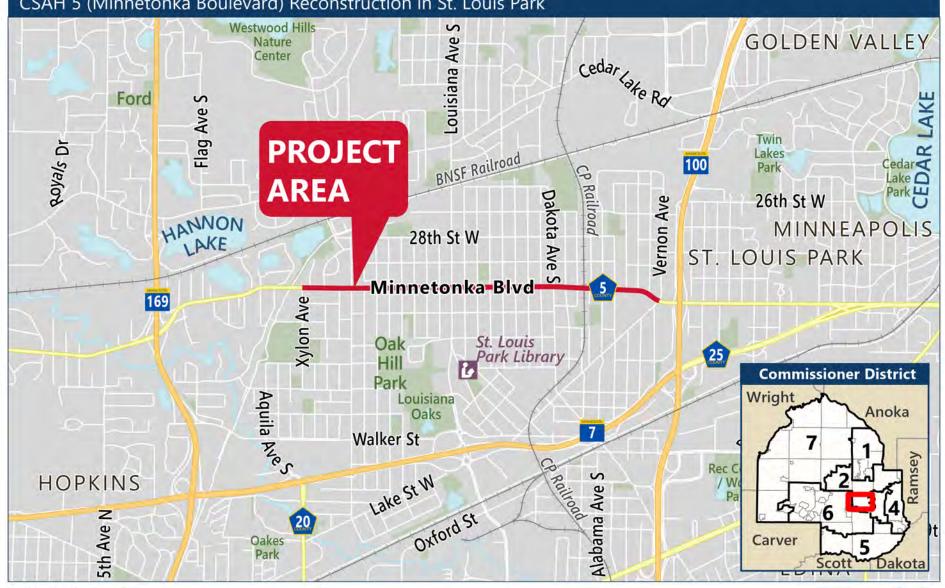

CSAH 92 (County Rd 92) Pavement Rehabilitation in the Cities of Greenfield and Independence

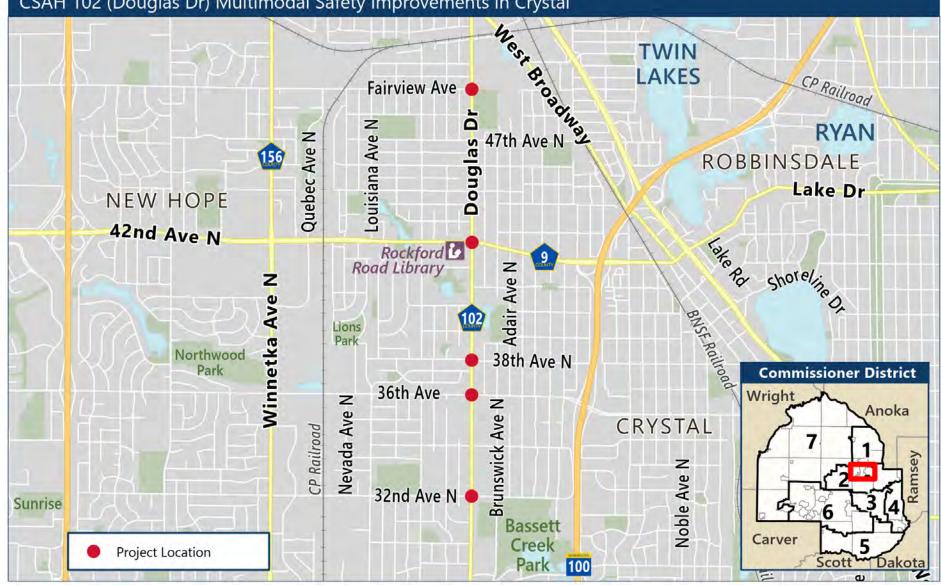

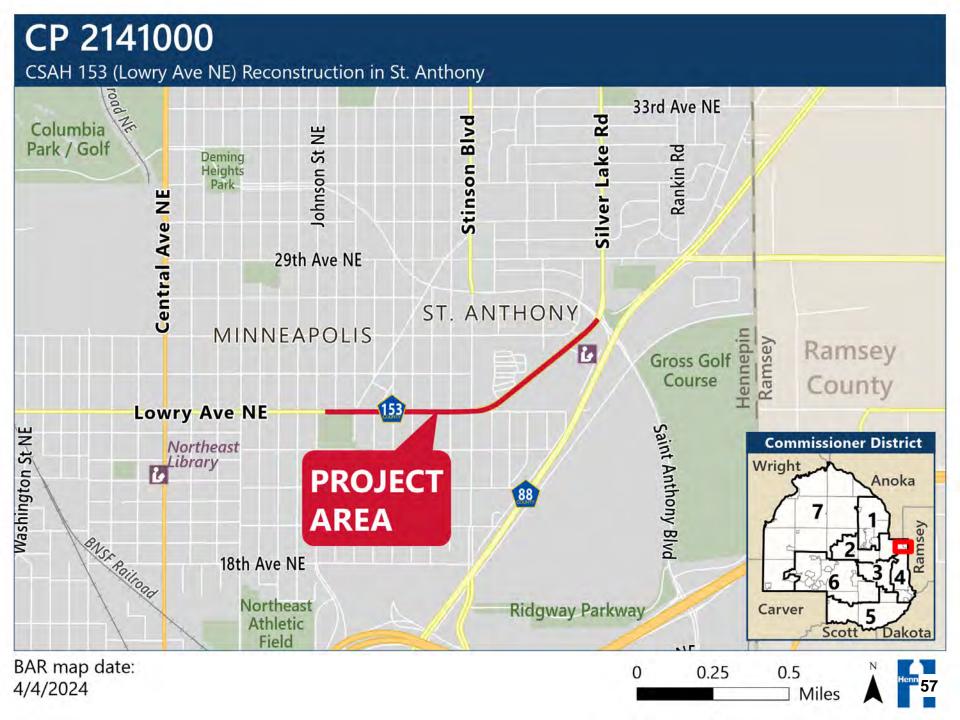

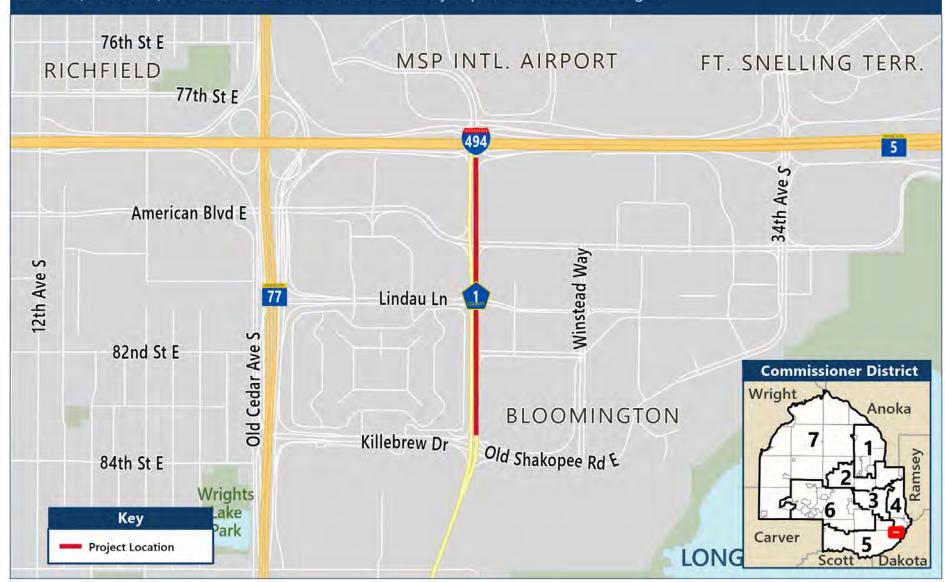

CSAH 1 (24th Ave S) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Bloomington

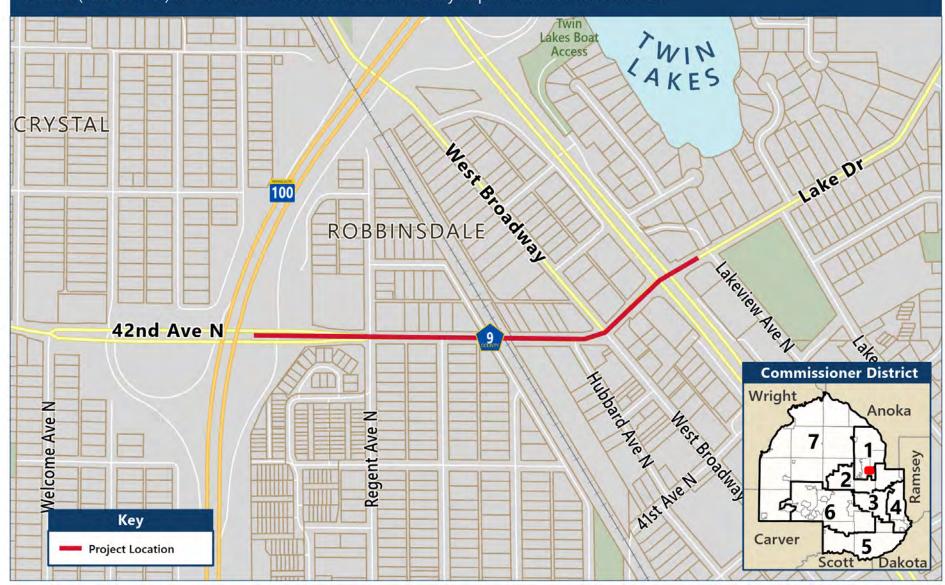

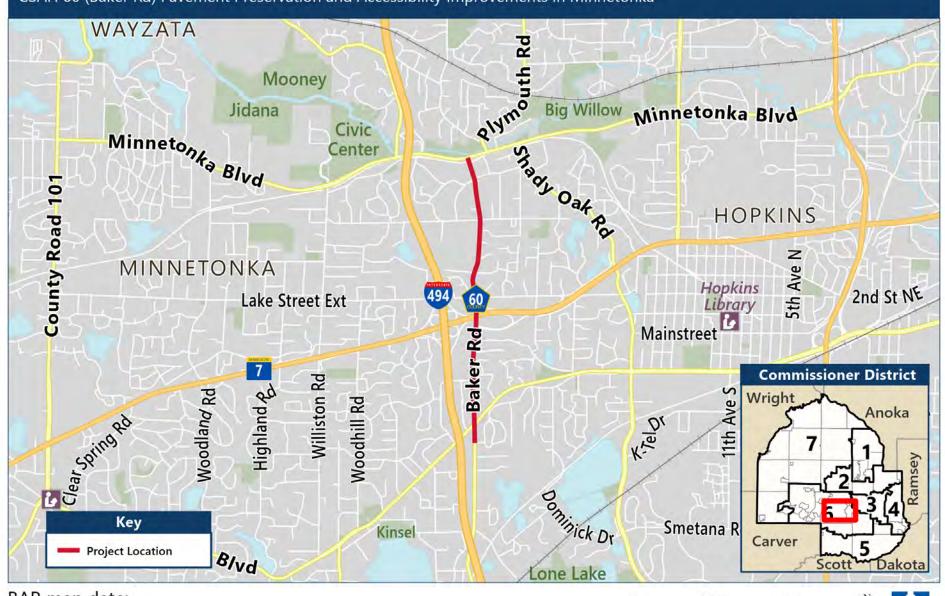

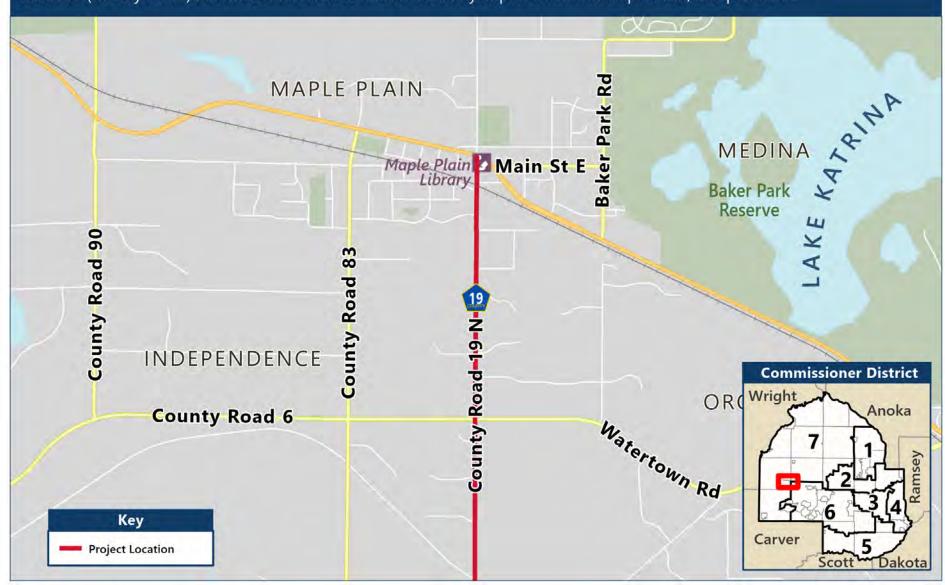

CSAH 19 (County Rd 19) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Maple Plain, Independence

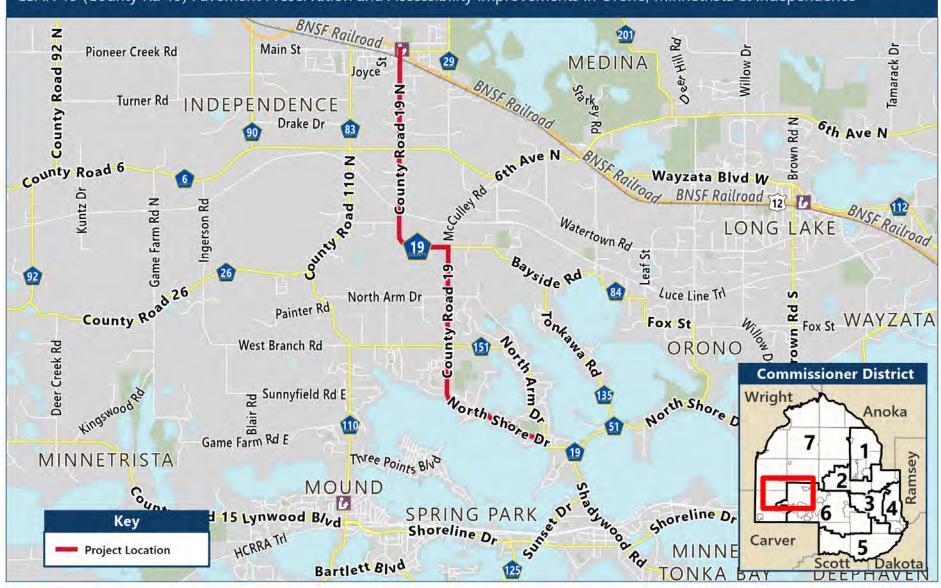

CSAH 19 (County Rd 19) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Orono, Minnetrista & Independence

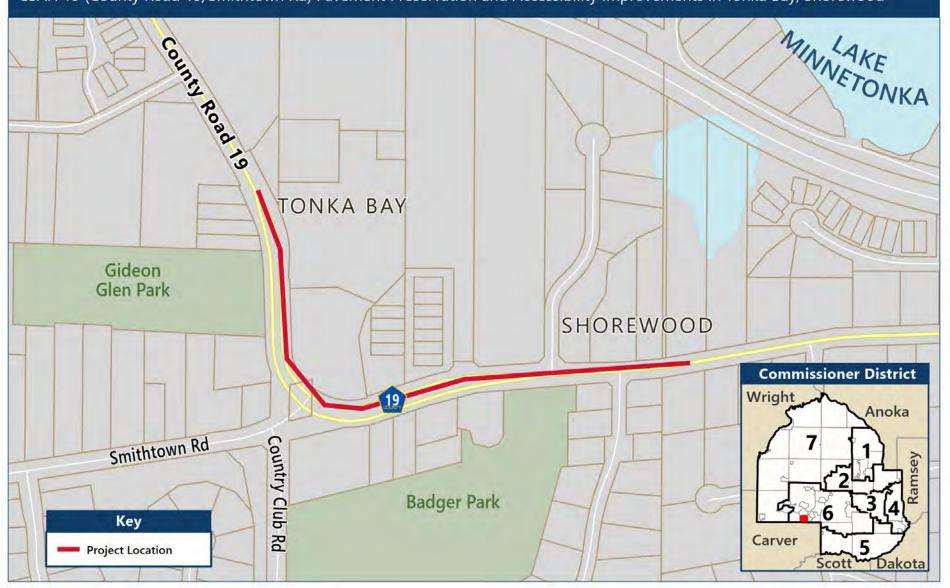

CSAH 19 (County Road 19/Smithtown Rd) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Tonka Bay, Shorewood

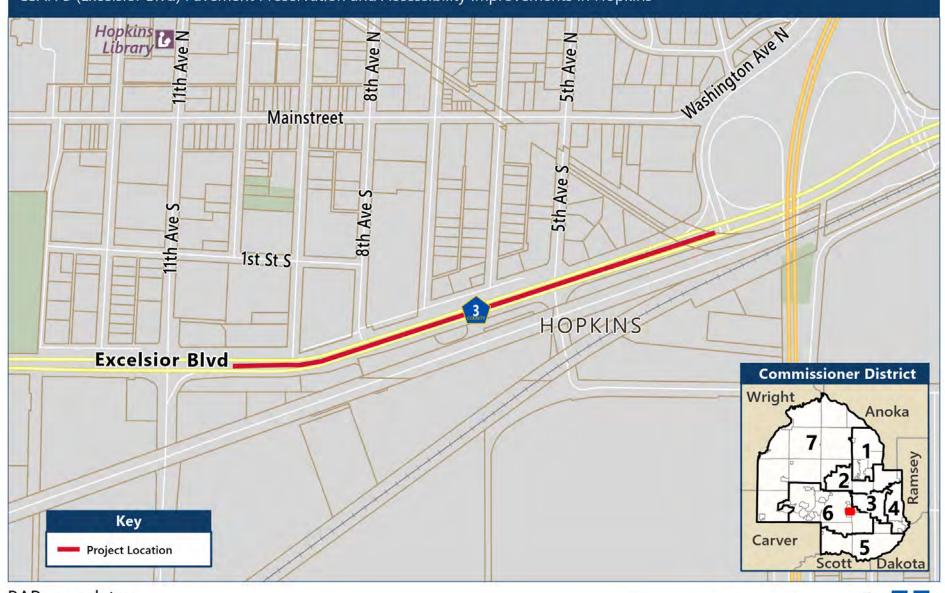

CSAH 3 (Excelsior Blvd) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Hopkins

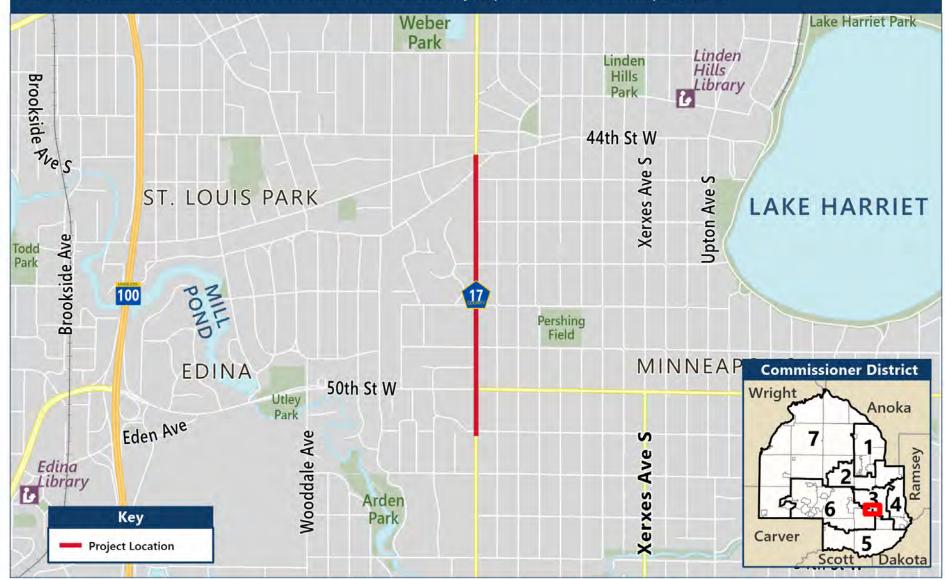

CSAH 17 (France Ave S) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Minneapolis, Edina

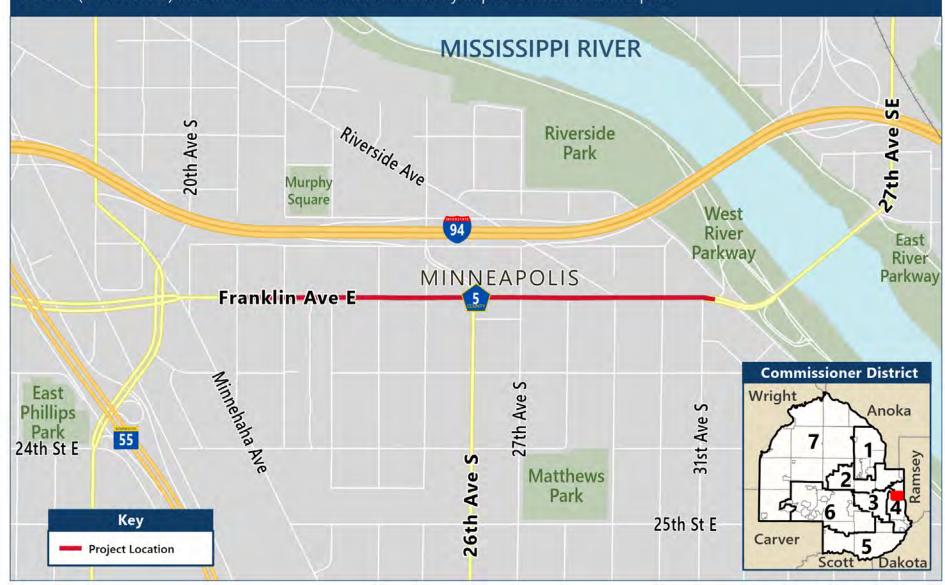

CSAH 5 (Franklin Ave) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Minneapolis

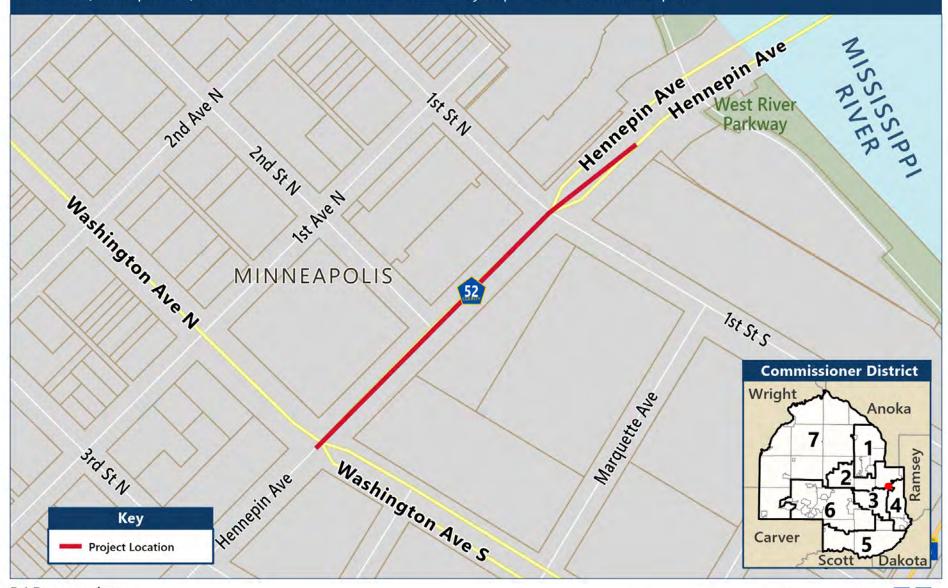

CSAH 52 (Hennepin Ave) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Minneapolis

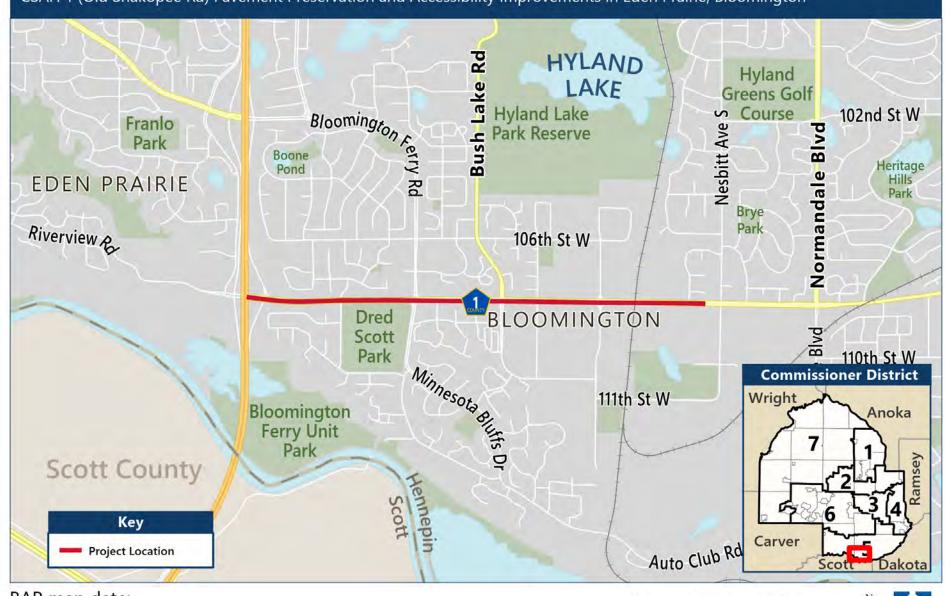

CSAH 1 (Old Shakopee Rd) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Eden Prairie, Bloomington

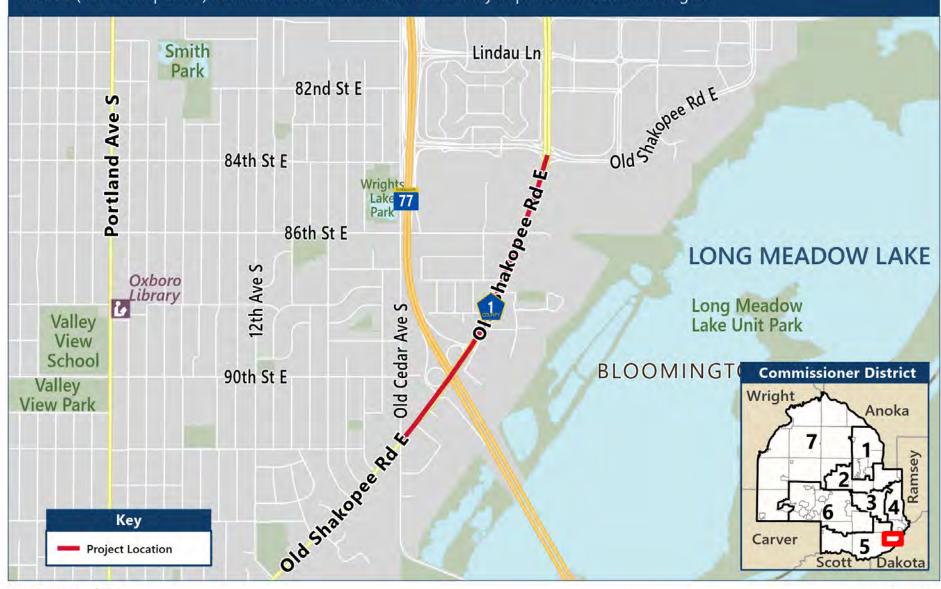

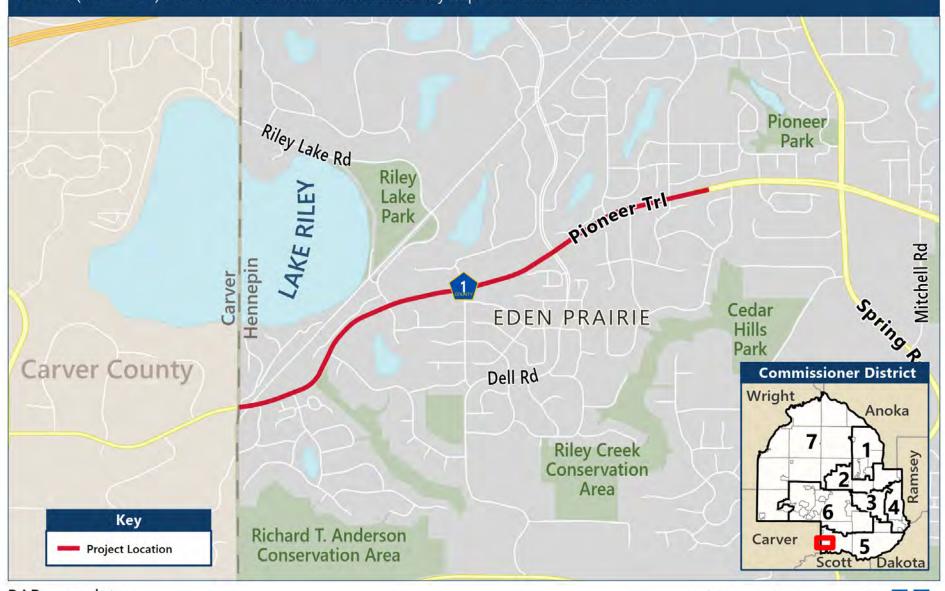

CSAH 1 (Pioneer Trl) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Eden Prairie

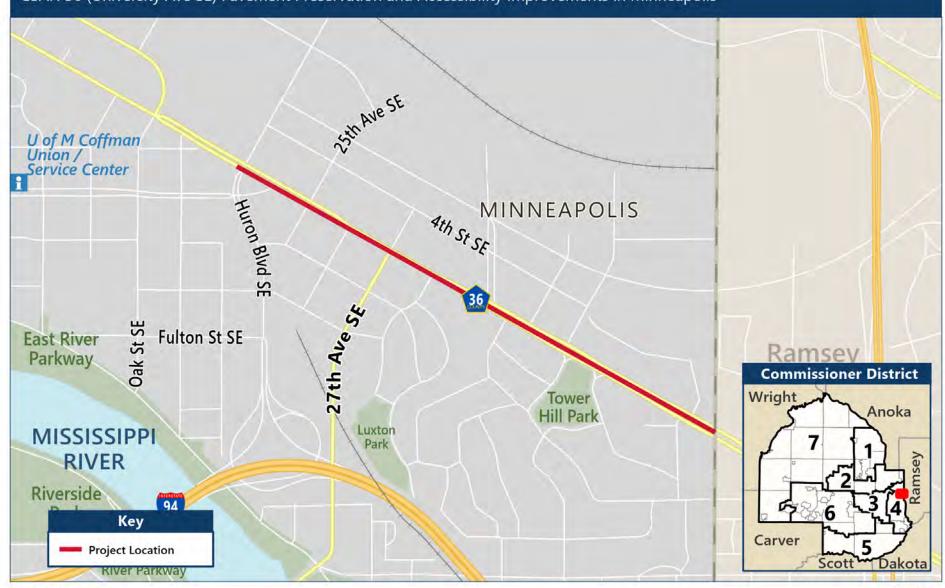

CSAH 36 (University Ave SE) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Minneapolis

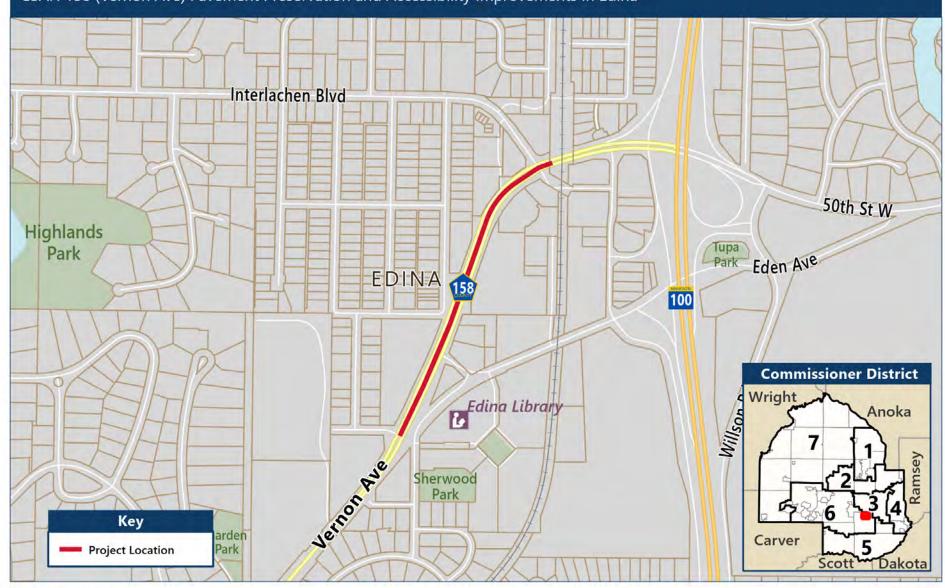

CSAH 158 (Vernon Ave) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Edina

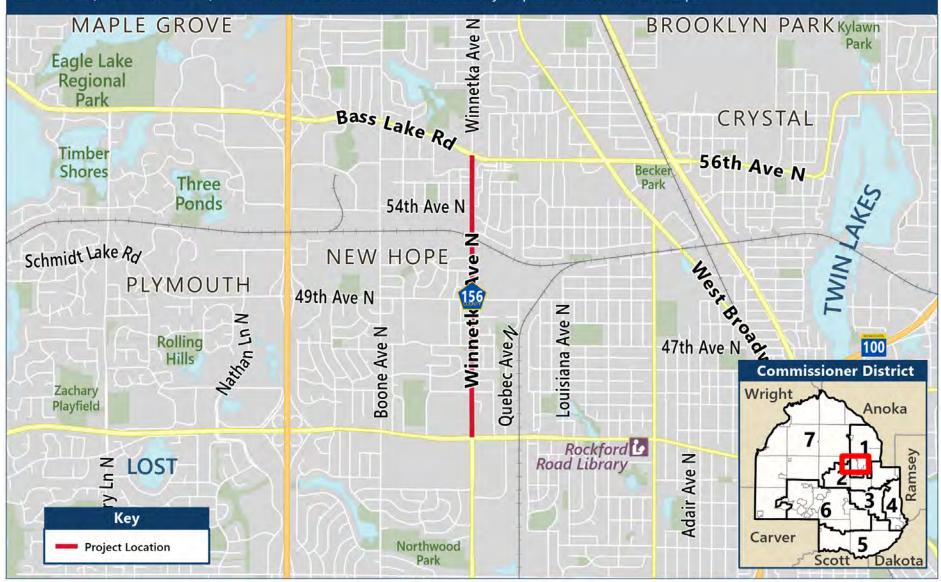

CSAH 156 (Winnetka Ave N) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in New Hope

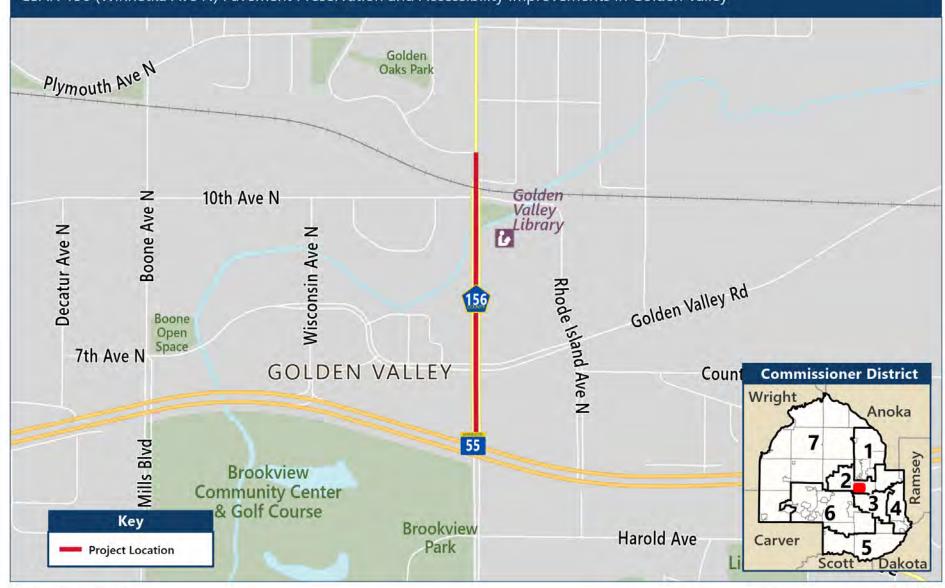

CSAH 156 (Winnetka Ave N) Pavement Preservation and Accessibility Improvements in Golden Valley

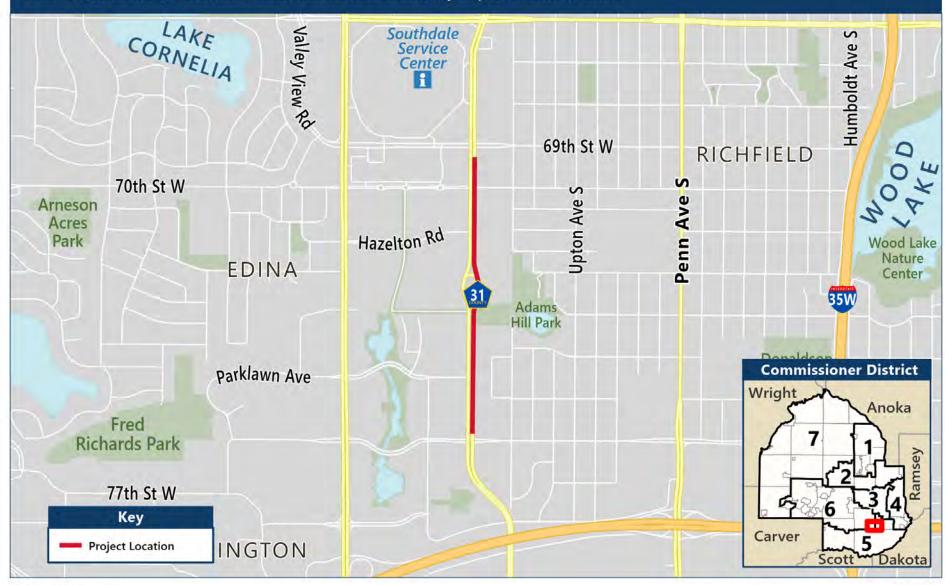

Background:

- Multi-modal improvements including curb extensions and raised medians.

Background:

The Hennepin County Board recently authorized Agreement A2211427 with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) accepting Lead Hazard Reduction Grant Funds (CFDA 14.905) in the receivable amount of \$6,700,000 during the period November 1, 2022, through July 1, 2027 (Resolution 22-0415). Grant funds will support testing of approximately 350 housing units and creation of approximately 340 lead-safe housing units.

Since 2019, the county has issued a bi-annual Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to form a pool of eligible, licensed lead hazard remediation contractors eligible to bid on individual home hazard reduction and improvement projects through a rotation process as projects are identified. The program's goal is to have 8-10 active contractors receiving projects. The RFQ is issued twice a year to allow new contractors into the program, enhancing competition and building a broader base of lead hazard remediation service providers.

In March 2024, the county issued the current pool-formation RFQ. Based on that RFQ, staff is now recommending agreements with 11 qualified respondents to preform lead hazard reduction and healthy homes mitigation services. Staff is also requesting amendments to the existing 10 contracts to extend the contract period from December 31, 2024 to June 30, 2027 and to adjust each contract's not to exceed amounts as needed for the remainder of the contract period, as the competitive bid rotation impacts the work allocation.

Current Request: This request is for authorization to negotiate 11 new agreements and amendments to 10 existing agreements to provide home hazard reduction and improvements, during the period May 15, 2024 through June 30, 2027, with a total combined not to exceed amount of \$3,700,000.

Impact/Outcomes: Approval of this request will create at least 340 lead-safe and healthy housing units in Hennepin County.

The leased space is utilized as temporary safe space for families experiencing homelessness. Under Lease Agreement LS00000032, authorized on December 22, 2023, by Resolution 23-0506, the County has the right to extend the current lease term through July 21, 2024.

Amendment 1 to Lease Agreement LS00000032 with St. Olaf's will allow the County to extend the lease beyond July 21, 2024, on a month-to-month until such date that County makes the decision to no longer renew/extend the lease, or until St. Olaf's exercises its right to terminate the lease with thirty (30) days' written notice to County. Base rent will remain at the current rate of \$7,000 per month plus operating costs of approximately \$2,000 per month. Operating costs are adjusted each month based on the actual costs of the previous month.

Hennepin County has had a shelter-all policy for families with children since 2005, but recently that practice has been severely tested and family shelter and overflow sites were above normal capacity. Levels of family homelessness began increasing steeply following the end of the pandemic-related federal rent assistance program and the eviction moratorium in 2022. Hennepin County remains committed to sheltering families and making homelessness rare, brief, and nonrecurring. Through the lease of this Building, Hennepin County can continue to ensure that an option is made available for families with children if occasions arise where temporary shelter capacity is otherwise full on the day it is needed.

Background:

Under the provisions of Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), the Governor of each State or Territory must submit a Unified or Combined State Plan to the U.S. Department of Labor that outlines a strategy for the State's workforce development system. The publicly-funded workforce development system is a national network of Federal, State, regional, and local agencies and organizations that provide a range of employment, education, training, and related services and supports to help all job-seekers secure good jobs while providing businesses with the skilled workers they need to compete in the global economy. In alignment with the State Plan, each local workforce development board must submit a three-year regional and local plan.

The Local Board for Workforce Development Area (WDA) 09, in this case the Hennepin-Carver Workforce Development Board, in partnership with the chief elected official for the local area, has developed the local plan which meets the requirements in WIOA section 108 and requires submission to the Governor.

The local plan includes a description of the strategic planning elements, consisting of:

- 1. an analysis of the regional economic conditions including existing and emerging in-demand industry sectors and occupations and the employment needs of employers in those industry sectors and occupations:
- 2. an analysis of the knowledge and skills needed to meet the employment needs of the employers in the region, including employment needs in in-demand industry sectors and occupations;
- an analysis of the workforce in the region, including current labor force employment (and unemployment) data, and information on labor market trends, and the educational and skill levels of the workforce in the region, including individuals with barriers to employment;
- 4. an analysis of the workforce development activities (including education and training) in the region, including an analysis of the strengths and weaknesses of such services, and the capacity to provide such services, to address the identified education and skill needs of the workforce and the employment needs of employers in the region;
- 5. a description of the local board's strategies and goals for preparing an educated and skilled workforce (including youth and individuals with barriers to employment), including goals relating to the performance accountability measures based on primary indicators of performance described in section

116(b)(2)(A) in order to support regional economic growth and economic self-sufficiency.

Taking into account analyses described in subparagraphs (A) through (D), the Local Plan outlines a strategy to work with the entities that carry out the core programs to align resources available to the local area, to achieve the strategic vision and goals described in subparagraph (E).

Per the requirements outlined by the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development, the Regional and Local Plan were subject to Public Hearing during the April 23rd meeting of the Hennepin County Board of Commissioners' Administration, Operations & Budget Committee. Input received via this Public Hearing has been incorporated into the Plan.

The Regional and Local Plan were also posted for public comment on April 17, 2024 and sent directly to partners and providers with an invitation to provide comment. Public comment is being accepted until end of business on May 8, 2024.

Current Request:

The action now requested by the Hennepin-Carver Workforce Development Board is for the Hennepin County Board of Commissioners to approve the Hennepin-Carver Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act Local and Regional Plan and authorize staff to submit the Plan to the Governor of the State of Minnesota. This local plan will then be incorporated into the Unified or Combined State Plan for the State and submitted to the U.S. Department of Labor. - Increase the flexibility of newly created courtrooms.
- Provide spaces for virtual hearings.
- Add consult rooms for court partner use.

Wold Architects and Engineers was selected by the County's Designer Selection Committee in the Fall of 2023.

There will be two general contractors for the two parts of this project. Using the above cited set-aside contracting authority for the HCGC A20-A21 District Court Self Help and Administration project will enable the county to have a portion of the construction work delivered by an Emerging Small Businesses Enterprise (ESBE) general contractor from the Department of Community Corrections and Rehabilitation's (DOCCR) Community Productive Day Construction Partnership Program. General contractors are qualified for this program based on their demonstrated success employing and training ex-offenders. The selected general contractor will be required to employ and provide on-the-job training to probationers during the performance of their contract for not less than 10 percent of the contract's total labor hours.

The Family Justice Center will remain open until the Government Center construction is complete in early 2026.

Current Request:

Approval is requested for Schematic Design of the projects, a contract with Wold Architects and Engineers for architectural and engineering services for the design development through construction administration phases, and authorization for the County Administrator to award contracts to the contractors with the highest scoring proposals if the proposals are within the project's budget.

The Schematic Design Executive Summary Report has been distributed to the County Board, and a copy is on file with the Clerk to the County Board.

Impact/Outcomes:

This project will result in the Courts moving from the Family Justice Center to the Hennepin County Government Center, the last move in the Downtown Master Campus Plan.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires Hennepin County to adopt a Five-Year Consolidated Plan in order to receive HUD entitlement funds for the following programs: Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME), and the Emergency Solutions Grant Program (ESG). Hennepin County is the lead HUD entitlement agency for suburban Hennepin County (recognizing that the cities of Bloomington, Eden Prairie, and Plymouth directly receive/implement CDBG funds in their communities). The 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan identified housing

and community development priorities and goals. The goals were established based on demographic and economic data, input from community engagement, consideration of the priorities already established by the Consortium and HUD, and an assessment of the funding resources anticipated to be available during the Consolidated Plan period.

The 2024 Action Plan is Hennepin County's application to HUD for the 2024 CDBG, HOME, and ESG allocations and follows the priorities and goals outlined in the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan.

To meet the above goals, the county will contract with external partners for \$5,962,133 (Attachment 1), and directly implement CDBG Administration (\$436,198), CDBG Homeowner Rehabilitation Program and Down payment Assistance Program (\$419,616) from the Consolidated Pool plus funds from direct allocation cities), and HOME Administration (\$148,405). ESG funds (\$243,609) will be administered by the county's Human Services and Public Health Department. Hennepin County HOME funding agreements are typically in the form of a 30-40-year loan and must be expended within five years. Any future program income may be allocated to the Homeowner Rehabilitation Program or administration, or elsewhere as needed.

A public hearing for the 2024 Action Plan took place on April 23, 2024, before the Administration, Operations and Budget Committee. In addition, the 2024 Action Plan was made available to the public for the HUD required 30-day public comment period between March 27, 2024 and April 30, 2024. The public comment period and public hearing are submission requirements of the Consolidated Plan and the Action Plan; public comments and the county's written response will be incorporated into the final document submitted to HUD.

The county has participated in the CDBG Program since 1974, the ESG Program since 1988, and the HOME Investment Partnerships Program since 1992.

Background:

The contracted dollar amounts are based on estimates of program costs and/or utilization during prior periods. Funding for each contract is provided for within service categories in the Human Services & Public Health Department and Department of Community Corrections and Rehabilitation approved annual budgets. Occasionally new services are implemented which are not in the budget, but which are fully funded under state or federal grants or other new funding.

Contracted dollar estimates are based upon prior year usage and are subject to fluctuation in placement patterns, service need, and cost shifts. Therefore, it may be necessary to process ministerial adjustments to contracts to increase or decrease contract amounts or to make minor service changes consistent with the department budget and strategic plan. Placement agreements are also processed administratively.

Contracts include services in the following areas: adult mental health; developmental disabilities; chemical health; adult housing; early intervention and family intervention services, interpreter services, health services, welfare advocacy, and various other human services. Expectations for ongoing outcome measurement are included in all new, renewal, or extended contracts. Outcome measures, which are developed by the county and contracted providers, assess the effectiveness of a service and its impact on an eligible recipient's condition or functioning level. Outcome information is used to modify or improve programs as well as to evaluate effectiveness of different types of intervention and providers. A detailed listing of the specific actions requested by this BAR and an explanation of all unusual items is reflected in the summary of the report.

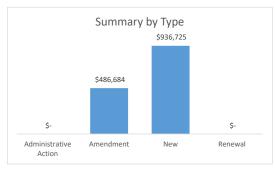

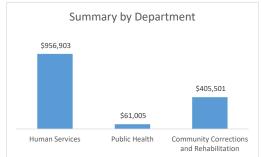

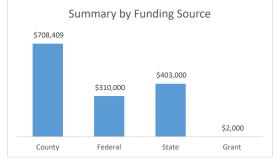

Background:

In 1980, Hennepin County entered into a court ordered settlement, hereinafter referred to as the Consent Decree, part of which directed the funding and creation of a panel of qualified attorneys from which appointments would be made to provide legal services to certain persons subject to civil commitment under the Minnesota Comprehensive Mental Health Act (Minnesota Statute Sections 245.461 to 245.4887). To fulfill this obligation, Hennepin County has contracted with the Hennepin County Bar Association to establish and administer a Commitment Defense panel, from which lawyers are represented to represent individual persons subject to commitment.

In 2022, the Hennepin County Board instructed the County to pursue a change to the Consent Decree to allow for Hennepin County Adult Representation Services (ARS) to provide this legal representation. In late 2023, Hennepin County filed a motion to vacate or alternatively modify the Consent Decree. In April 2024, a federal judge granted the County's motion and modified the Consent Decree, allowing ARS to provide legal representation to all respondents in mental illness commitment proceedings. As ARS builds capacity to take on the civil commitment practice area, a continued contract with the Hennepin County Bar Association is critical to ensure a smooth transition and continuity of representation for individuals subject to civil commitment procedures.

Current Request:

This amendment extends the contract through December 31, 2024, under the current contract terms to afford the County additional time to address the Consent Decree.

The Sheriff's Office will be providing similar patrol services to the City of Rockford on a contract basis. The agreement will be June 01, 2024 through December 31, 2024, which is the same end date as the contracts with the Cities of Greenfield, Hanover, and Medicine Lake.

The Sheriff's Office established hourly rates for 2024 to reflect expected costs, and the City of Rockford will be billed quarterly for these services.

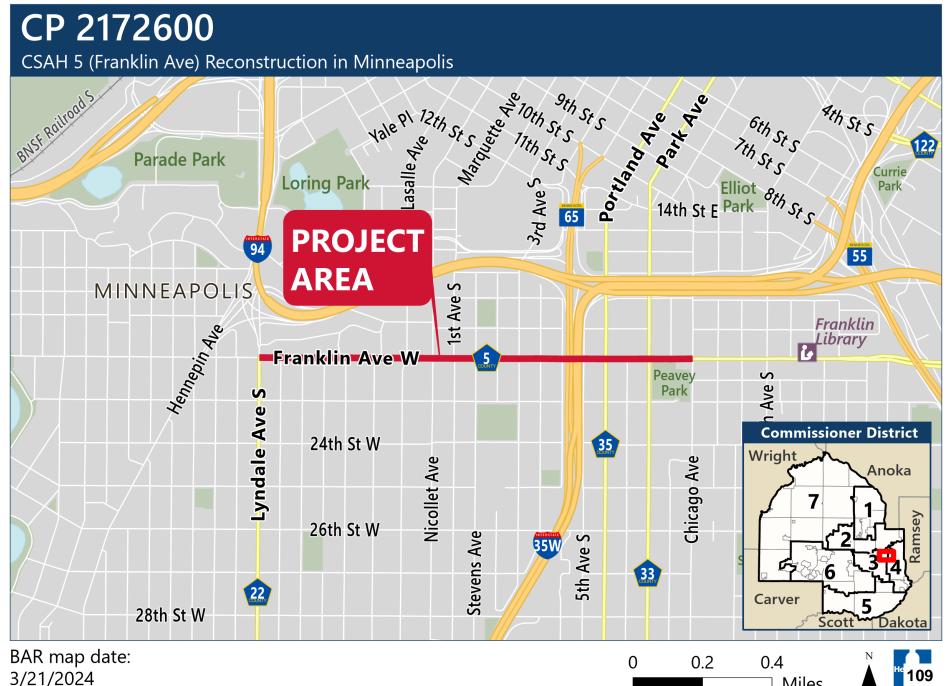

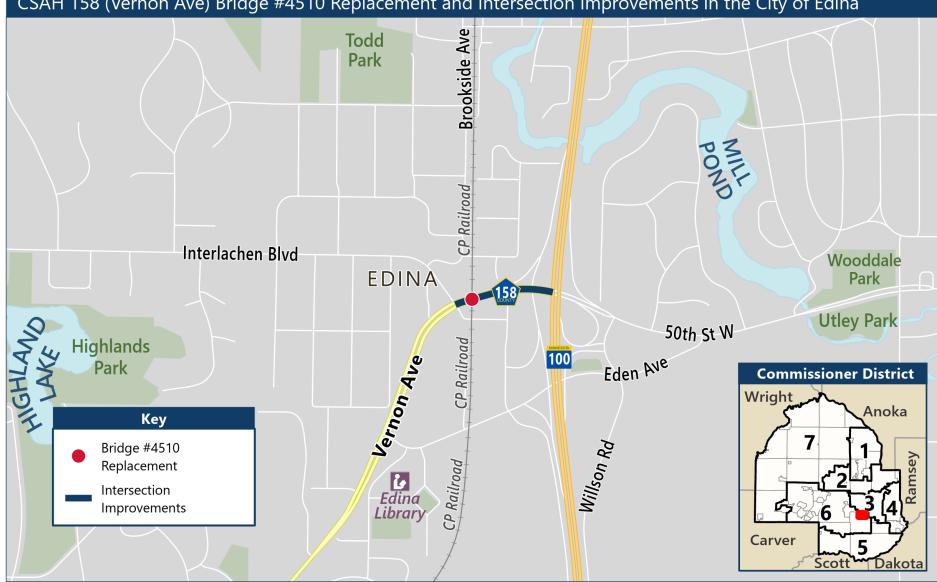

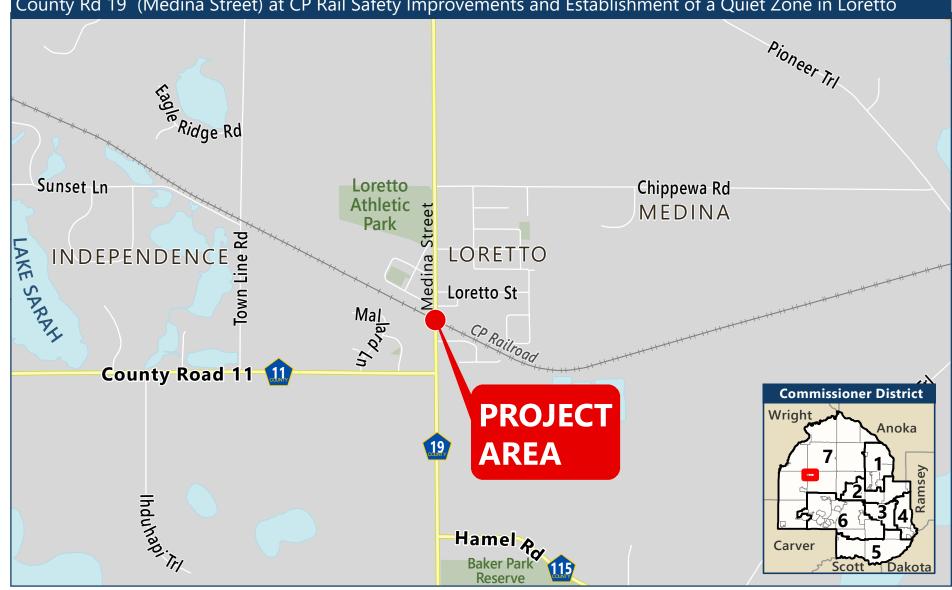

Background:

Land Information and Tax Services seeks to amend its current contract with Better Futures Minnesota to add boarding and securing services of Hennepin tax-forfeit properties to its routine exterior property inspections work. Better Futures completes inspections both during and outside Hennepin County's normal business hours, including weekends. This additional service will reduce the time a property is open to trespass, reducing the costs associated with properties open to trespass, such as theft, vandalism and dumping. The NTE increase is needed to cover the cost of materials and hourly rate of \$75 for these additional services. This contract was directly negotiated as permitted under the set aside statute (Minn. Stat. § 383B.145, Subd. 5), and not derived from a competitive bid. To date, \$69,519.28 has been expended from the contract.

Better Futures Minnesota is a Minnesota nonprofit corporation and social enterprise that since 2008 has provided employment to hundreds of men who are chronically unemployed or formerly incarcerated, while generating revenues to support its mission, utilizing four fundamental components: jobs, housing, health, and coaching supports.

Background:

For more than 50 years, Hennepin County has been contracting with cities to provide local assessing services. These contracts have required cities to pay the county to perform this local assessor work. The first joint powers agreement between a city and the county began in 1972. Hennepin County has had a long-term strategy of contracting with cities to perform local assessing to ensure accuracy, efficiency, and equitability across all jurisdictions.

Over the past several years, Hennepin County has significantly increased the number of cities with whom it contracts for assessing services. Currently, 34 of 45 cities contract with the county either wholly or partially for these functions, with 33 of the contracts expiring on July 31, 2024. In addition, the county is statutorily responsible for the assessments of the Minneapolis/St. Paul Airport and Fort Snelling. These 34 cities collectively pay the county approximately \$5.1 million in 2024 for these services.

This resolution directs the county to offer a joint powers agreement for local assessing services to cities with populations of 30,000 or less and those currently under current contract with the county at no cost to these cities beginning with the 2025 assessment. By the county providing this service at no cost to these cities, this will reduce the city property tax levy obligations for these cities by \$5.1 million collectively. The county assessor's 2025 budget will reflect an increase of \$5.1 million from the county property tax levy to offset this loss of contract revenue.

State law authorizes counties to perform these local assessor obligations in cities with a population less than 30,000 at county cost, Minn. Stat. §§ 273.052 and 273.053; and authorizes counties to contract with cities to perform these obligations if these cities choose to contract with the county. Minn. Stat. §273.072.

The joint powers agreements will be perpetual agreements and highlight the services and responsibilities to be provided by the county assessor as required by law. These joint powers agreements will come forward in a separate board action request later this year.

The Vocational Services Program (VSP) provides vocational rehabilitation services for Hennepin County residents who experience serious mental illness and/or substance use disorder. The mission of VSP is to assist people with finding and keeping jobs in the community that provide stability, lead toward self-sufficiency, and enhance their quality of life. All individuals participate voluntarily and are referred by the Department of Employment and Economic Development/Vocational Rehabilitation Services who purchases these services using 'Professional and Technical Services Master Contract' (P/T Contracts).

In 2023 VSP served a total of 67 individuals. VSP services includes career counseling, job placement, and extended employment assistance. VSP has worked to expand services from 18+ to 16+ by providing early intervention services and support focused on increasing work skills, self-advocacy, career and college exploration, post-secondary supports, and more. VSP received 8 referrals for the transition aged population in 2023.

This Board Action Request seeks to revise contract language and contact information, update and increase the Fee-for-Service Rate Schedule and extend the contract to June 30, 2027.

Disparity Reduction: The program supports the County's mission to enhance the health, safety, and residents and communities in a respectful, efficient, and fiscally responsible way. The board action request aligns with Hennepin County's disparity reduction efforts by supporting employment for residents with the goal of gaining a livable wage and moving out of poverty. VSP's services support Hennepin County's racial disparity reduction goal in the domain of employment by increasing hiring opportunities and career advancement.

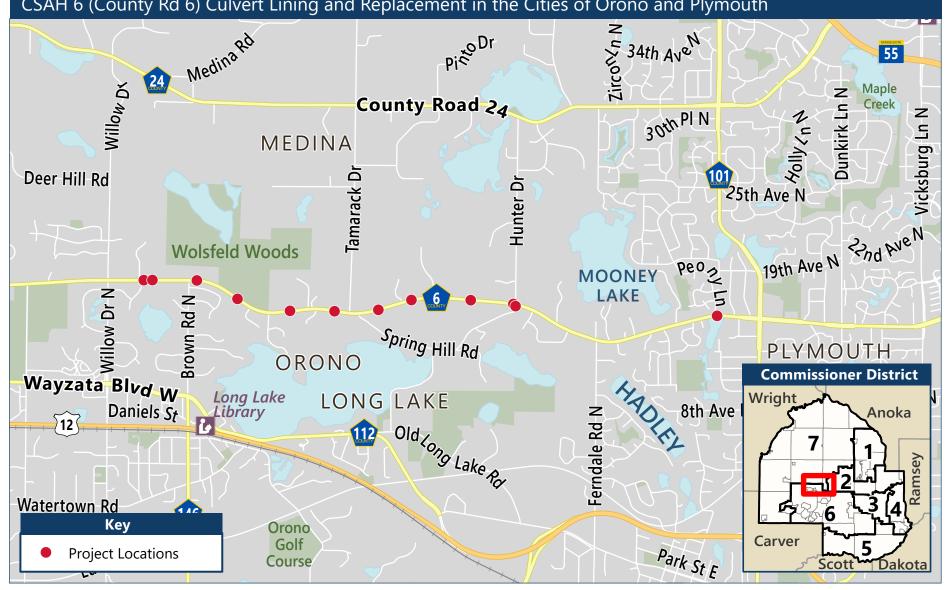

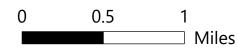

Background:

Brooklyn Park Transfer Station is a 94,000 square foot waste management facility on a 10-acre site located at 8100 Jefferson Hwy in Brooklyn Park. The transfer station processes waste for over 75,000 residents.

This project will improve workplace safety and energy efficiency. Specifically, the project will:

- Modify the ventilation system ductwork, exhaust fans, supply units, etc. serving the waste transfer tipping, pit, and recycling areas to create a central high bay exhaust plume for improved dust control and energy conservation.
- Update the building automation system graphics to meet new ventilation strategy and to provide improved real time exhaust fan status reporting and historical trending.

Through the low bid procurement process, a request for bids was released on April 9, 2024. Two (2) bids were received on May 7, 2024. Northland Mechanical Contractors was the low bid and is recommended to be awarded the contract for the project in the amount of \$1,816,000.

Following panel interviews, Ms. Spates' name was moved forward as the recommended candidate for the Executive Director position. On Monday, May 6, 2024 the NorthPoint Community Board approved Ms. Spates as Executive Director. The County Administrator then made a conditional offer of employment to Ms. Spates subject to confirmation by the County Board.

Ms. Spates has over 20 years of experience as a public and nonprofit sector health and human services leader, Since 2014 Ms. Spates has been the Chief Operations Officer of NorthPoint Health and Wellness Center, Inc. In this role she collaborated with internal clinical partners and community partners to implement a whole person care model within the NorthPoint Federally Qualified Health Care Center. Throughout her tenure she managed delivery of integrated health and human services to over 20,000 children, adults and seniors annually through building and maintaining collaborative relationships with governmental agencies, community, community board and staff. This included managing an annual budget of \$12 million, leading operational areas of human resources, information technology, finance, policy development and process improvement.

As part of the NorthPoint executive team Ms. Spates has supported community board initiatives and committees, led cross organization health and human services efforts and ensured that human services are integrated with clinical operations to improve patient outcomes.

Ms. Spates holds a Master of Arts in public administration and nonprofit management from Metropolitan State University and a Bachelor of Arts from Texas A&M University.

Under Minn. Stat. § 383B.102(c)(3) and the County's policy on Open and Unclassified Service Appointments, the county board approves appointments of personnel to unclassified service positions.
